Check Forger Taken Near Shelburn

While he was being trailed up railroad tracks and down roads by two men, Messrs Gibbons and Russell, both of Shelburn, Sheriff Bodine, O. A. Archibald, cashier of the First National bank, Sanford Archibald, his son and Ed Tyler, the driver, dashed to North Santiam, a distance of about 15 miles, over bad roads, in an auto in 71 minutes yesterday and arrested Ray Pearl, alias C. L. Wilson, on a charge of forgery. He was brought to Albany and was arraigned before Justice Swan. Waiving examination, Pearl was bound over to the grand jury in bonds to the sum of \$2,000.

According to the complaint against Pearl, he cashed a check for \$125 on the Bank of Brownsville March 23. The check was signed with J. C. Davis' name and was indorsed by A. L. Austin and Ray Pearl. Davis is a wealthy resident of Shedd. The check was on the local First National bank and when it arrived, it was found to be a forgery.

The bank officials immediately conducted an investigation. Learning that Pearl had been making his home near Shelburn, they notified several parties to let them know if he should turn up again. Pearl was located yesterday and was going under the name of Wilson. The bank was immediately notified.—Albany Herald.
