WHITE MIGHT HAVE BEEN BEAR'S VICTIM

He Disappeared Mysteriously Last February While on a Trip in the Detroit Woods

Up to the present time no trace whatever has been found of W. F. White, the Detroit trapper, who mysteriously disappeared while on an expedition in the woods near French creek last February, according to A. G. Hinckle, a resident of Hoover, who is an Albany visitor today.

While many theories are advanced as to White's disappearance, Mr. Hinckle is of the opinion that both he and the dog were killed by an attack from a wild beast, probably a bear or cougar. The supposition is that the animal attacked the dog first, and then attacked White. The fact that it was with difficulty that the searchers went over the route supposed to have been traveled by White, owing to windfalls and the rugged condition of the country leads Mr. Hinckle to believe that there was only one chance in many that the body could be found. Mr. Hinckle said White had a narrow escape with a bear last year.

M. F. Hare, who accompanied White to French creek, where they parted, Hare taking another route to collect some traps for White while he proceeded on a hunting trip, could not in any way be linked with White's disappearance. It will be remembered that Hare was arrested at Albany about three weeks ago by the Marion county authorities, as he was en route through Albany to Pendleton where he had secured a job. He was taken to Salem and given a thorough examination, the authorities going on the supposition that he and White had had a quarrel, but nothing could be proven against Hare. He was allowed to proceed to Pendleton.

Mrs. White and her son several weeks ago went up to Washington to reside with some relatives.—Albany Herald.
