ELECTION OFFICER IS FOUND GUILTY

Albin L. Clark Was Convicted of Altering
the Ballots in Favor of Tom

Portland, May 30.—Albin L. Clark was found guilty of altering 126 ballots in precinct 37 at the November election, when a jury in Circuit Judge Gatens' court returned after eight hours of deliberation last night. Clark, whose first trial resulted in a disagreement of the jury, was chairman of the day election board. Ballot alterations in favor of Tom Word for sheriff were discovered by the night board and more were found later during recent proceedings which Mr. Word instituted against Sheriff Hulburt.

The jurors, in returning the verdict, handed Judge Gatens the following letter:

"In connection with this case we, the jury, desire to enter a protest against the system which permits the appointment of election officials in the manner disclosed by the testimony in this case, and we hope the parties who instigated this crime will be brought to justice."
