tunnel a little farther here, or a shaft a little deeper there and hence we now find two small stamp mills running, with good results to their operators on the oxidized ore of this region.

On Mount Ogle, is a modern mill costing upwards of \$75,000, erected to treat the refractory gold and silver ore found there. Owing to being just set up, the mill needs some further adjustment, it is reported, before running steadily.

In the succeeding issues I will endeavor to give your readers a history of the principal mines and also of the North Santiam. I will also try to tell something of the life of these bold hearted men of the hills, who seek the treasure that mother nature has hidden here, for this is a land of promise, it is a treasure house awaiting the key in the hands of the explorer and slowly but surely that key is being forged and fitted to that lock.
