HUERTA TAKEN INTO CUSTODY

**Plot to Violate Neutrality is Charged
—General Orozco Also Was
Arrested**

El Paso, Tex., June 28.—General Huerta, ex-president of Mexico, arrived here today, accompanied by several well known Mexicans. Soon afterward he was taken into custody on charges of conspiring to incite conspiracy against a friendly country and held for a time at Fort Bliss, until he gave \$15,000 bail.

General Orozco was detained with him, on the charge, and also released later on \$7500 bail.

The charges were filed by special agents of the department of justice.

United States officials were silent relative to future action pending the receipt of instructions from Washington. Observers, however, freely expressed the belief that today's action of United States authorities will have an important bearing on Mexican developments, if it does not effectively put an end to rumors of a new revolutionary movement that has been current on the border for several months.

Many were inclined to see in these events an indication that Washington remains firm in its attitude, that Huerta's return to Mexico would not aid in adjusting the present difficulties and might serve to complicate them.

A public demonstration in Juarez about the hour Huerta's train was due to reach this city ended as suddenly as it began. There were hurried conferences among Mexican leaders on both sides of the Rio Grande. Many guardedly admitted that Huerta's detention was of the utmost importance, but none would comment on its possible effect on Mexico.

Americans were freer in their comment. They reviewed the recent activity along the border of the adherents of the Cientifico party in Mexico, including the disbursement of considerable sums of money for a variety of purposes, the discovery of many rifles and much ammunition in an El Paso warehouse owned by a member of that party and the appearance of General Salazar in Western Chihuahua. They recalled the activities of General Orozco, Carazo and Salazar in the anti-Mexico revolution and their subsequent service during the Huerta regime.

Mob Unchecked in the Mexican Capital

Washington, June 30.—Despite conditions in Mexico City, with unchecked mobs rioting and looting, are described in dispatches cabled to the United States government tonight from Vera Cruz by a courier who left the Mexican capital last Friday.

When the courier started, practically the entire garrison had withdrawn to join the Zapata army on the outskirts of the city opposing the attacking Carranza force under General Gonzales. Gonzales had been driven back with considerable loss and was waiting for reinforcements from Vera Cruz.

He has just been informed that he has been awarded a gold medal on the exhibit and that the new grain possesses splendid qualities as a flour producer.—Lebanon Express.

Fire Sweeps 10 Acres

Albany, June 29.—Two hundred cords of wood were destroyed in a fire which ran over 10 acres of timber on the farm of William Serfling on the South Santiam river, between Thomas and Crabtree, last night. The fire endangered about 300 acres of timber and an additional 600 cords of wood. About 50 firefighters from the surrounding country, stopped it.

Canal Tolls \$4,000,000

Washington, June 29.—A total of \$4,000,000 in tolls was collected for the use of the Panama Canal in the period of time between the opening of the waterway for traffic in May of last year up to June 6 last.

During April the tolls for the first time were greater than the cost of operation and maintenance of the canal.

ANXIETY IT FELT FOR MEXICO CITY

**Washington Fears For Foreigners' Safety
General Carranza is Massing
Troops**

Washington, June 29.—In the absence of direct reports from Mexico City, which for nearly 10 days has been cut off by rail and wire from the outside world, there was much anxiety in official quarters today concerning conditions in the old capital and its vicinity.

From previous dispatches it is known that the food supply is short and that the danger of military operations in the city itself has caused grave apprehension among foreigners.

The state department's only information during the day came from American consular officers at Vera Cruz, whose reports were summarized in this statement:

"The department's latest advice regarding the Mexico City situation are to the effect that General Carranza is massing a large number of troops and expects to take the city in two or three days. He has issued instructions to protect non-combatants."

WIDE RECRUITING PLOT INDICATED

**Soldiers and Sailors of United States
Induced to Desert and Go
to England**

San Francisco, June 29.—The Federal grand jury today dug deeper into the maze of the secret operations of alleged recruiting agents of the British government in San Francisco.

John Preston, United States district attorney, advised the examination of another witness held in New York.

It was said at the close of today's session of the grand jury that the name of the San Francisco bank through which the alleged recruiting of 300 men here was financed, has been learned.

Convict Escaped

A convict escaped from the penitentiary, probably a trusty, Tuesday morning at about 9 o'clock. After escaping he traveled south and was located near the railroad bridge of the North Santiam. He does his traveling at night when most people are off the road.

To Survey An Extension to the C. & E. Railroad

A. L. Potter, civil engineer, Alvin Raines, a former A. H. S. and O. A. C. student, and Clinton and Harold Archibald, left this morning for Hoover, where they will be engaged in plotting seven miles of road for the government in making an extension for the present terminal of the C. & E. to the forest reserve. While there is no immediate prospect for the road being built the government does this to facilitate the sale of timber in the reserve, and when the sale is made and the buyers are ready to cut the timber, the road will be laid out.—Albany Democrat.

Sheridan Dogs Muzzled

Sheridan, Ore., June 29.—All dogs in this place and at Willemina, five miles west of here, have been ordered muzzled by the sheriff. This order is due to a supposed mad dog running at large in the hills about here.

FAVORABLE GERMAN REPLY PREDICTED

**American Ambassador at Berlin Makes
Forecast on Note to State
Department**

Washington, June 28.—Favorable reply from Germany to the late note of the United States concerning submarine warfare and the sinking of the Lusitania was predicted in an official dispatch from Ambassador Gerard, received today at the state department. It was transmitted to President Wilson at Cornish, N. H.

While the ambassador did not attempt to outline the forthcoming German note, he described the atmosphere in Berlin official quarters as favorable to a satisfactory reply.

He referred to the visit of Dr. Anton Meyer-Gerhard, the emissary of Count Bernstorff, the German ambassador, pointing out that the latter's information apparently had inspired the German government with the idea that the United States did not want war with Germany, but desired satisfactory reply to her original demands.

The fact that Ambassador Gerard took occasion to predict informally the nature of the reply was regarded as significant in official quarters here, where it was pointed out that the Ambassador's forecasts in the past had been conservative and consistent. Although it was not generally known, he gave the Washington government to understand what would be contained in the last German note, and the text itself bore out his predictions.

Santiam Mining District

Our last letter was furnished on arrival at Elkhorn on way to the Crown Mines. A 36 hour rain kept us indoors as a debut in the western Cascades at such times, drenched to the skin.

We started on the two-mile climb to the Crown mines at 7:30 p. m., leaving Elkhorn at an elevation of 1150 feet. We wound in and out for an hour and a half and reached the cabin at dark, the elevation being 2700 feet, or 100 feet lower than Prineville in Eastern Oregon. Morning brought floods of sunshine in all their mountain beauty. Four hungry men devoured great stacks of "Compton's best" in the hot cake line. We were off early to view the property of the Crown mines. Starting east, a half hours walk brought us to the top of a small mountain some half a mile east and 700 feet higher than the cabin. The mountains were beautiful; the scope of vision excellent. Almost directly beneath us 2000 feet lower, dashed the raging Santiam, while stretching onward and reaching up to the mountain top, the sloping fields of blooming Rhododendrons faded from vision in the distance. Bird, animal and flower life is much more numerous in the mountains than in the valley. Floral clad hills, singing birds, slashing streams and beckoning skies, what richness of beauty. Yet old Mother Earth, the great store house of the

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
