age, has stored immediately beneath our feet, great treasures, as can be amply verified in time, if all indications, assays and tests continue to be as those already tested.

Here we stand on the promitory. We see the slopes of mountains leading up from Gold creek mines some six miles east, while three miles forward and over a thousand feet below us the buildings and properties of the Black Eagle mines stand out plainly and almost two miles north is the Silver King mine property and two miles farther is the famous Ogle mountain property, whose outlet is through Scotts mills and Oregon City and where so much pure gold has been taken. Here we stand surrounded by mines from one to six miles distant.

We now drop down an eastern slope some 500 or 600 feet to cuts No. 3 and 4 of Crown mines and find conditions as described in their prospectus. I wish to ascertain the mineral zone so claimed. We go to the foot wall then start for the hanging wall with our mining tools, we continue to find mineralized stone as we ascend. On reaching the heaving wall, we come to granite rock without a trace of mineral. It seems that in the days when the world was young a great crack or seam appeared in the surface of the mountain and during the forming, building and reconstruction of earth the internal heat, volcanic action and other molten processes has played in and out of this mighty seam or crack and the residue of such substances and action has left the crack filled with highly mineralized stone. This, the mother ledge, has been broken to all appearance, at places from time to time by volcanic or other actions of the earth and somewhat dislocated, thus forming the near by mines. But the Crown mine to all appearances, is the mother ledge. The assays and general description of this mine, which is the only mine in the district to be granted a charter by the Blue Sky law, is given in this prospectus. Everything so far as I could find out is as represented by the company.

We spent three days, doing all we could to verify and feel satisfied. A twelve mile walk to Gates and the C. & E. and then home again.
