JURY OF ADVISERS FIND THAW IS SANE

Judge Will Announce the Decision Tomorrow—Verdict is Reached Quickly

New York, July 14.—Harry K. Thaw today was declared sane by a jury which for nearly three weeks listened to testimony given in the Supreme court here before Justice Hendrick. Forty-eight minutes were consumed and two ballots were taken in reaching a verdict.

Justice Hendrick will announce on Friday whether the commitment on which Thaw was incarcerated in the state hospital for the criminal insane at Matteawan shall be vacated, thereby giving to the slayer of Stanford White the liberty for which he has fought in the courts for nine years.

Dragged to His Death in Mower Runaway

Oakville, Or., July 13.—Jas. McBride was dragged to death yesterday when the team he was driving while mowing hay became frightened at a dog chasing a rabbit and ran away, dragging him across rough stubble and fracturing his skull when they plunged through a rail fence.

Mr. McBride, who was 83 years of age was as hale and hearty as many men of 40 and experienced no difficulty in doing a man's work in haying. While mowing he had wrapped the reins about his hands to keep them from dangling down and becoming entangled in the machine.

When the horses became frightened and started to run, he was thrown off his seat as they crossed a deep deadfurrow and because the reins were wrapped about his wrists, was dragged face down over the stubble.

His face was badly cut and his skull fractured when a rail fence was struck, a deep gash being cut in his head.

\$100,000 Offer is Made

New York, July 12.—William F. McCombs, chairman of the Democratic national committee, received today from Dallas, Texas, an offer of \$100,000 as a cash contribution to the funds of the national democratic committee should the 1916 convention be held in that city.

Dallas also pledges a coliseum seating 25,000 persons and adequate accommodations for both delegates and visitors.
