CREDIT IS GIVEN TO THE ANGELS

War Miracle Tales Find Many Believers
in England—Stories Often
Repeated

London, July 21.—Most clergymen, both Church of England and nonconformist, are convinced that England's cause is just and that God is on her side. Some of them actually believe that angels are helping British troops to triumph over the Germans. A church of England clergyman at Southampton writes in his parish magazine:

"The daughter of a well known canon of the church knows two officers, who themselves saw the angels who saved our left wing in the retreat from Mons."

Then he goes on to describe how the German cavalry in overwhelming numbers were swooping down on the British.

"They saw between them and the enemy a whole troop of angels," he goes on. "The German horses turned around, terrified, and stampeded. The men tugged at their bridles, but the poor beasts tore away in every direction from our men."

90,000 Chinese Lost in Flood

Washington, July 20.—From 80,000 to 100,000 lives have been lost in the floods in the vicinity of Canton, China, according to a cablegram to the state department today from Peking. Consul General Cheshire has appealed for all the assistance that can be rendered by the navy department.
