Home From Experimental Station Examinations

Hon. Jefferson Myers, of Portland a native of Scio, passed through the city last evening on his way home from an extensive trip through Oregon. It was made in company with President Kerr, of the O. A. C., on a visit to the different experimental stations of the state in charge of the Agricultural college. They went down in the east side, first examining the station at Hermiston, traveling by automobile, covering the eastern Oregon trip that way, going down into the Klamath country and back by way of Medford. They found things in good shape, all the experimental stations making a good showing. Mr. Myers thinks the work of the O. A. C. a great one for the farming interests of the state.—Albany Democrat.

Paper Mill Site Chosen

Albany, July 26.—That plans are developing satisfactorily for the establishment of a paper mill at this city, which will be one of the largest plants of its kind on the Pacific coast is the declaration of R. Thomas of Portland, who is promoting the project.

A sight for the plant has been selected north of this city adjoining a string of lakes, which makes the location ideal. Mr. Thomas is the owner of a process for the manufacture of paper from various kinds of Oregon timber that cannot be utilized in paper manufacture through processes in general use. For that reason the industry which he is projecting will be a big one for this state.

Albany Gets First Wheat

Albany, July 28.—The first 1915 wheat received in Albany was delivered at the Red Crown mill, of the Portland Flouring Mills Company today. It came from the farm of Edward Holloway, about four miles southeast of Albany. It tested 62 pounds to the bushel and was of splendid quality. Threshing began in this county Monday, but rain interfered today.

Wheat thus far threshed, is running from 20 to 30 bushels to the acre.

Radio Crosses Pacific
