HOLLAND SEEKS TO BRING ABOUT PEACE

Diplomats Urge That War Might Be
Ended At Once if Steps
Are Taken

Rotterdam, Aug. 10.—There is much talk in Holland of the possibility of opening a discussion between the belligerents on peace terms. The Courant publishes today an article from anonymous diplomatic sources urging that an immediate peace might be possible, if not easy, and recommended that the press of the neutral countries undertake the task "of mediation and reconciling and removing the errors."

The Dutch anti-war league at a meeting last week adopted a resolution urging the Dutch government to call a conference of the neutral powers in the interest of peace, the conference to sit until the end of the war for the purpose of preparing for and introducing mediation measures at the proper time.

The article in the Courant says in part:

"Although the prospects of the Germanic powers now are better than they ever were before, they cannot hope for a settlement by battle, and therefore, wiser counsels may prevail. As to the British, it is not impossible that they will ultimately listen to the voice of reason. There is no reason why the opponents should offer conditions that would only prolong the war unduly. There are increasing signs that international hatred is decreasing. In the not too distant future the people of Europe will demand to know how long the war is still to last."
