NAVY TO ASK FOR MONSTER WARSHIP

Super Battle Cruisers, Costing \$18,000,000 Each, Are on the Programme

Washington, Oct. 5.—Super-battle cruisers, bigger, faster and more heavily armed than any war craft now afloat or building and which will cost \$18,000,000 each to construct and equip, will be recommended to congress as a part of the navy building program for next year.

This decision was reached today at a conference between President Wilson, Secretary Daniels and Representative Padgett, chairman of the House naval affairs committee.

Just how many of the new type ships will be asked for this winter has not been determined, Secretary Daniels said. Cost of construction of navy craft has risen since the outbreak of the European war, with the consequent enormous demand upon American resources, some recent steel contracts for the navy showing an increase of 50 per cent over previous prices.

July—United States, Southern Russia, Austria, England, Germany, Switzerland.
August—Canada, Holland, Belgium, Denmark, Poland.
September—Scotland, Sweden, Norway, Siberia.
October—Northern Russia and Siberia.
November—South Africa and Peru.
December—Uruguay, Austria.
The United States exports harvesting machinery to all the countries named, and also to many others.—Farm & Fireside.
