MONTENEGRO BOWS TO POWERFUL FOE

The Unconditional Surrender Asked by
Austria is Accepted, Says
Berlin

Berlin, Jan. 18.—The king and the government of Montenegro on Jan. 13 asked a cessation of hostilities and opening of peace negotiations, it was officially announced today by Austro-Hungarian headquarters.

"Montenegro asks for peace," said Count Tisza in the Hungarian parliament. The proceedings under the first paragraph of the order of the day had just been completed when Count Tisza asked for permission to interrupt the discussion. He said that the and government of Montenegro had asked the inauguration of peace negotiations.

The announcement caused a great commotion in parliament.

"We asked that beforehand Montenegro unconditionally lay down her arms," continued the premier.

Joyful shouts followed this statement.

"Just at this moment," he continued, "the news has arrived that the unconditional laying down of arms has been accomplished."

"Since the preliminary condition has been fulfilled, peace negotiations will be entered into immediately."

A Mint of Money

The former director of the United States mint in Philadelphia, Mr. Landis, resigned after serving for 12 years. In commenting on the fabulous wealth that has passed through his hands Mr. Landis states that it consisted of \$11,000,000 in cents, \$19,000,000 in nickels, \$65,500,000 in silver dollars, halves, quarters and dimes and \$372,000,000 in gold. The entire coinage totals \$462,500,000.

MOVE FOR GERMAN REPUBLIC IS BEGUN

Manifesto Reported to be in Course of
Preparedness in City in
Switzerland

London, Jan. 15.—It is reported from Zurich and corroborated from Berne and Geneva that a German republican manifesto will be issued in the near future at Zurich. It is said that behind the movement are scientists and other leaders of culture in Berlin, and the opinion is expressed that when these persons declare for a republic in Germany some 2,000,000 social democrats and syndicalists will at once rally to their support.

Republican sentiment, according to the rumors in question, has been brought to a head by apprehension that the Emperor's illness may prove to be so serious that the Crown Prince may be called to the leadership of the state. It is declared that the intellectual classes in Berlin and other centers of German thought will not tolerate the accession of the Crown Prince to power at this grave crisis in the affairs of the German empire.

However strong or weak may be the feeling in support of a change in the form of the German government, it is said that there is no question that the reported republican manifesto will be issued. Among its contents, as it is described in the Zurich story, will be a passage declaring that truly German ideals have been trampled under foot by the present rulers and that the removal of these is essential if the Fatherland is to escape irreparable disaster.

Teams Cross Columbia on Ice

The Dalles, Jan. 18.—This city is experiencing one of the coldest spells in its history, the mercury having dropped to 17 below last night. The maximum temperature this afternoon was 4 above. During 43 years the period for which an official record has been kept, The Dalles has been colder than 17 only twice.

A heavy blanket of snow covers the ground. Teams hauling loads are now being driven across the Columbia river here.

RAILWAY EARNINGS SHOW BIG GAINS

Increase is More Than 18 Per Cent
Over Same Period of Time
of Year in 1914

Chicago, Jan. 18.—Gross earnings of United States railroads continue to reflect a large movement of freight in all parts of the country, the total of all roads making weekly returns that have reported for December amounting to \$32,085,042 and increase of 18.7 per cent as compared with the corresponding month a year ago.

Practically all roads of any importance made satisfactory gains, but the improvement is especially marked on the leading systems of the south, indicating a complete recovery from the depression that prevailed in that section at this time last year.

Among the roads showing the most pronounced increases are the Chesapeake & Ohio, \$985,571; Southern, \$672,788; Louisville & Nashville \$917,188; Cincinnati, New Orleans & Texas Pacific, \$203,491; Alabama Great Southern \$120,131; Western Maryland \$264,875 and Mobile & Ohio, \$96,283.

Bad Accident

ARMY AND NAVY ACADEMIES ASKED

Twenty Million Dollars for New Army and
Navy Schools Sought by
Jones and Humphrey

Washington, Jan. 18.—Senator Jones and Representative Humphrey of Washington, today introduced bills appropriating \$15,000,000 for the establishment and equipment of a military academy, similar to West Point, at some place in the state of Washington to be designated by the Secretary of war. They also introduced bills appropriating \$5,000,000 for establishing in Washington a naval academy patterned after the academy at Annapolis.

In addition Senator Jones introduced bills as follows:

Approximately \$3,000,000 for the construction of a drydock at the Puget Sound navy yard.

Quieting the title of settlers in good faith on Northern Pacific Railroad Company lands and providing for the granting of lieu lands to the railroad for lands lost by settlement.

Appropriating \$25,000 for surveying and beginning construction of a road in the Olympic National Forest from the government fish hatchery on the Big Quileene river to the summit of Mount Constance.

Appropriating \$100,000 for the construction of a road in the Mount Baker forest reserve from Glacier to Mount Baker.
