Martin & Brant's saw mill loaded two cars of lumber for points in Colorado this week.

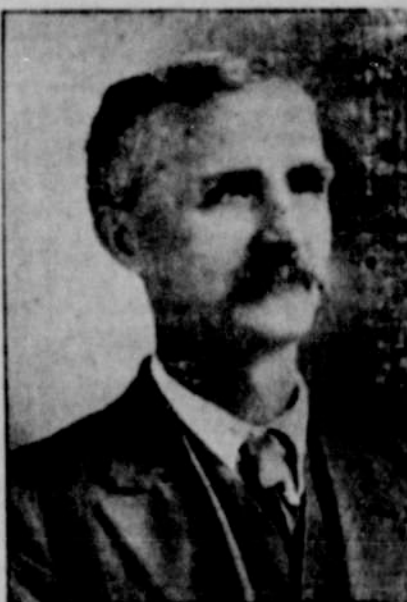
District school board meeting developed one more month of school which will give us eight months school.
