would hinder and not hasten matters."

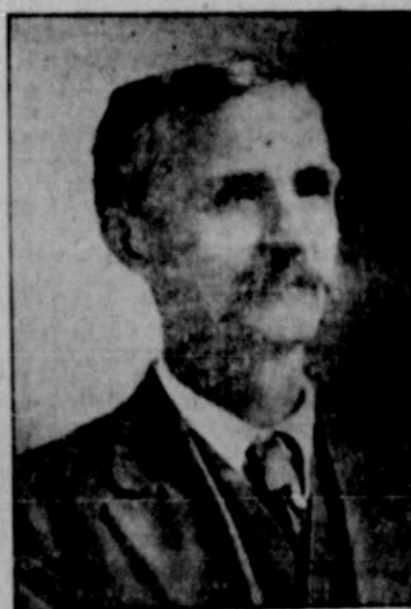
Speaking regarding the course the campaign will take, General Funston said:

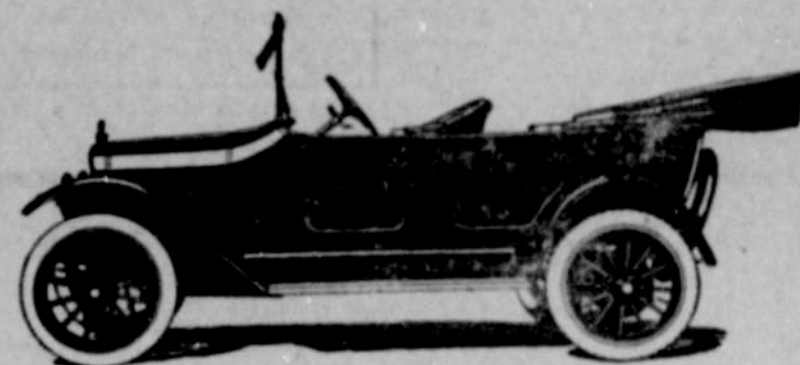
