Bad Business Method

Our city council at its last regular meeting ordered the city treasurer to pay a \$100 bond out of the sinking fund of the light and water plants.

It is eminently right and proper to pay a debt when one has the money, but in this case the debts are different.

When the light and water plants were rebuilt, a 20-year bonded indebtedness was incurred, bearing six per cent interest. To gradually take care of this bonded indebtedness, an ordinance was enacted devoting fifteen per cent of the receipts from the light and water plants as this sinking fund and to be used for no other purpose whatever.

Last year the repairs and other expenses of the light plant were greater than the receipts, and interest bearing warrants were issued to cover this deficit.

These outstanding warrants bear eight per cent interest, while the bonded indebtedness bears but six. But as the bonds are not due for fourteen years, the Tribune thinks that the sinking fund should be made useable to pay any debt against the plant, preferably those bearing the largest interest rates. But such use cannot be made so long as the present sinking fund ordinance maintains.

The council will probably repeal or amend this ordinance at its next regular meeting so that these floating warrants can be paid.

Laugh Coming The Other Way Now

When Wm. Brenner was making garden sometime in February, a great deal of joshing and good-natured fun was had at his expense. In fact, his friends kept him at the telephone a good part of one day answering queries about his garden. The Brown Rot of the Prune

The last few years has been quite a loss to the prune growers of the Willamette Valley. The amount of brown rot on prunes may be greatly reduced by adapting the following spray schedule.

First spray, just before the petals open, second, about two weeks after they fall, third, about four weeks before the fruit is ready to harvest.

These three applications, if thoroughly done using a fine mist spray under good pressure and covering all the fruit, twigs and foliage, will result in a decided benefit.

What to Use for This Spraying

Bordeaux mixture 4-4-50 or even 3-3-50, using a sticker of 2 lbs. of resin to each 50 gallon of the spray, or use the lime-sulfur. — Using for the first spray 1-30, and for the second and third sprays 1-50. You should use caution in doing this work. DO NOT PUT THE SPRAY ON DURING A VERY HOT DAY, OR DO NOT DRENCH THE TREES. Although every part of the trees and fruit must be thoroughly covered with a fine spray to secure the proper amount of protection.

Correct spraying is an art that can only be acquired by practice. Use the angle spray nozzle to get the best results, as you can spray in any direction by simply twisting the spray rod.

It will be very helpful if the trees are pruned so as to let the sun and air to the inside of the trees as much as possible. This pruning will also make it possible to get at the inside of the trees to do better spraying.

It has been found that any means that can be adopted to get rid of

the rotten prunes that fall to the ground in the fall, or of the mummies that hang on the trees during the winter, will help materially in the control of the brown rot.

It has been recommended to plow the orchard before the trees are in bloom to get rid of the mummies that are on the ground, so there will be no old fruit to produce spores for

the infection of the blooms.

If you have sprayed your trees in the last few weeks you can omit the first spray above.

You can use the above on peaches and cherries for brown rot.
