N. M. Newport, of Lebanon Candidate For the Legislature

N. M. Newport, of Lebanon, who is a candidate for the republican nomination for the legislature from Linn county, is the only candidate for that position from the north half of the county, there being three to nominate and there being five candidates, the other four being from the south half of the county.

Mr. Newport has lived in Oregon for more than 30 years and has lived in Linn county for 24 years, 14 years in Albany and 10 years in Lebanon. He was raised on a farm and his people have all been farmers and he owns 160 acres of land in Linn county. He has always been interested in farm and farm life. He has become by his own industry and efforts one of the substantial tax payers of the county. He is married and has a wife and two daughters, both the daughters now being in high school. He has been a strong friend of the public schools and has taken a deep interest in school affairs for he has been one of the best friends the young men in the school have had, and has assisted a number to complete the high school course. For several years he has furnished the high school with an athletic field free. He believes in good schools, good roads, and good citizenship. But he is a strong advocate of strict economy in public affairs. He believes that the people are entitled to a dollars worth of results for every dollar of public funds extended.

GERMANY'S REPLY

(Continued from page 1)

President Wilson's note was a positive demand. It cited a condition which, if it was Germany's purpose to continue, meant the severance of diplomatic relations. Germany's equivocal reply shows a disrespect for the American nation, because of lack of frankness. It is next door to insult. The president demanded to know what her future submarine purpose was. Germany after arguing the question states that certain orders had been given her submarine commanders, but ending the note by saying by implication, unless we made England raise her blockade the orders to her submarines would be countermanded.

Just what President Wilson's next action will be has not been made public. But every American citizen who has red blood in his veins will be glad to see him make the words of his last note to Germany good. He should at once and without any further parley, recall Ambassador Gerard and give the German ambassador at Washington his passports.

But President Wilson abhors war and is willing to go to great lengths to avoid sending America's young men out on the firing line as food for bullets. He knows the enormous cost in blood and treasure war entails. We may, therefore, reasonably expect that he will watchfully await the actions of Germany's undersea boats, before he takes any further action. But he should curiously inform Germany that the first lapse of her submarines to the indiscriminate sinking of either passenger or freight steamers, will mean the severance of diplomatic relations and that a repetition of the same will bring about active retaliation.

Germany's actions through her agents and sympathizers in our own country, in fomenting strikes; in endeavoring to destroy our ships with planted bombs; in her activities in American politics, etc., shows that her boasted friendliness to the United States is but a sham. She does not merit even common courtesy from the American government.
