Notice of Proposed Street Improvements

DISTRICT NO. 4

Pursuant to Resolution, adopted by the City Council of the City of Scio, Oregon, at a regular meeting thereof, held on the 4th day of May, 1916, notice is hereby given that the said City Council proposes and intends to improve North street from the west line of Main street to the west line of West street, by grading and draining and macadamizing the same to a width of 16 feet.

That the total estimated cost of said improvements is \$987.69.

That the total estimated cost per front foot is \$57.55.

That the estimated part of the cost to be borne by the City is \$101.30.

That the estimated part of the cost to be borne by the property benefitted thereby is \$886.39.

That the assessment district to be benefitted and assessed for this improvement shall be determined to extend one-half block, or a distance equivalent to one-half block where property is not platted, on each side of North street and for the entire length of the district described.

Remonstrances against the said proposed improvements must be in writing and filed with the City Recorder within twenty (20) days from the date of first publication hereof.

Candidate For the Nomination of County Surveyor Before the Republican Primary

I have been asked, many times, this question: "Can accurate surveys be made in Linn county without the aid of the original field notes of E. T. T. Fisher, county surveyor from 1881 to 1899, and the government

field notes as arranged and used by E. T. T. Fisher?

Coming directly to the point in this matter, I have this to say: The county has on record a copy of all the government field notes, except a portion of the rough mountainous lands in the far eastern part, and these notes are on record in the U. S. Surveyor General's office in Portland and not owned by any individual. Furthermore, the law specifically says: "The county must have on record, the notes of all surveys made by every county surveyor and every deputy."

Mr. E. T. T. Fisher was, without doubt, the most popular and without exception, the best county surveyor Linn county ever had. Mr. Fisher put more work on record than, perhaps, all other surveyors before and since his time. In the face of all this, who would dare accuse Mr. Fisher of withholding anything from the records which was of any value or importance to the county or the people of the county?

Furthermore, what man would want any surveyor to make a survey for him who relied on anything other than the original government field notes and those on record?

A county surveyor should be a man who, not only can run lines, but he should be a civil engineer, capable of designing bridges, planning, laying out and constructing roads, and helping the road supervisors in their important work. He should also keep the records open for public inspection.

I wish to say to the voters of Linn county that I am relying upon my own merits, qualifications and experience and not upon any individual's field notes to elect me to office.

I am thoroughly familiar with the manner of conducting an up-to-date surveyors office and know both the theoretical and practical sides of engineering and surveying.
