Fair Fund Appropriated

Secretary Ben W. Oleott has appropriated some \$46,724.75 of the county fair fund to the 35 counties in proportion to population. Though Marion county has no county fair and is liberally taken care of by the legislature in the way of special appropriations for the state fair held in that county, gets her portion the same as the others.

to assail our next legislature with all the power that city can muster to reopen the Ashland normal school.

Only a few years ago, Oregon had four normal schools. Even to give them a halfway support, the burden was too heavy for the tax payers, and the whole bunch were denied state aid and, as a result, they were starved out. Then Monmouth insinuated herself into the good graces of the legislature and the people and was reestablished on a millage basis. But let a normal be established at Pendleton and Ashland with equal justice, can ask recognition and with seemingly a better right than Pendleton, for Ashland now has a building. Further, if the Pendleton school is voted, why may not every other county in the state be favored with a like school as well?

Our state made a grave mistake when she took on the college business. If all the money which has been expended for our state colleges had been expended for our public and high schools, then would our general standard of education have been raised and placed within the reach of all taxpayers.

Of course all right thinking people favor good schools. But to build colleges to give less than five per cent of our boys and girls a technical education, at the expense of what might be given to the other ninety-five per cent, is neither just nor right. When we recognize and support a college in one county, we cannot justly refuse the same to another county, for to favor one or more and refuse others is not a fair deal. We have made the mistake of thus favoring Lane, Benton, Polk and Multnomah counties, but let us not go wrong further.

Oregon now pays the highest per capita tax of any of our states. Surely it will be unwise in the extreme to add to this handicap. On the Pendleton measure every voter that has the general good of the state of Oregon at heart, will vote NO.
