## Proposed Hard Surfaced Roads

The Tribune has been shown a map of proposed roads, to be hard surfaced within the next five years, which have been agreed upon by the grange, farmers unions and others. The funds with which they are to be constructed will be derived from a 5-mill tax to be levied each year. This will cover all sections of Linn county fairly well. Of course these hard surfaced roads will not run by every farm, for they are intended for trunk roads to carry the main heavy travel. Side or lateral roads can be constructed later on. Petitions to have this road plan on the ballot next fall will be out next week.
