Candidate for Re-election

Every worthy citizen of Linn county is interested in its public schools. The school problem is one that is independent of all others and one of the most important responsibilities placed on the public, as Linn county has 137 school districts, over 8000 children and about 250 teachers employed. This being the case the supervision of this work requires the very best of ability along many lines. My record as a teacher and superintendent in the schools of the county, covering every phase of school work from being a teacher in the most remote rural school, the graded town school, the high school and my services as county superintendent has been one of approved success and is but an open book to those who care to investigate. In recognition of this fact I have been petitioned by about 98 per cent of the teachers and encouraged by many representative citizens, regardless of party lines, to become a candidate for re-election. In view of my practical experience and acquaintance with the teachers, the children and the local conditions in every district in Linn county I feel that I am in a position to render a service in the schools that can not be duplicated by another short of several years of experience in these schools.

In educational policies I favor practical and thorough work in all grades of the school and carried on at as little expense as is consistent with business principles. The work of the office has been conducted at a much less expense than is the minimum provided by law—investigate this statement.

The rural school supervisory law at no time in my hands but optional with the school directors for the last school year, has through the office of the county superintendent, been submitted to a vote of the directors and by a small majority discontinued, and as a result the county superintendent is now acting as the rural supervisor of the entire county instead of a portion of it as under the old law. In addition to the regular work of the office, I have promoted the high school system making Linn county one of the banner counties of the state. The school house has been made a greater civic center by originating the community meeting, for the purpose of discussing questions of practical value, also, the school and volunteer road day in many communities. The industrial work and school fair as originated during my term has resulted in interesting several hundred children who are doing special work at home without cost to the general public.

I am an advocate of a practical citizenship, and in the proper physical, mental and moral development of the youth of our county. Trusting that I may be found worthy of the favorable consideration of the voters of the county, I have the honor to remain,

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A REPUBLICAN BOUMERANG.

Nothing so forcefully reveals the desperate situation at the Republican National Campaign headquarters as their attempt to discredit President Wilson's Mexican policy by a "Movie" picture directed by a pardoned convict, whose idea of a "thrill" is a scene showing nuns being ravished and whose conception of patriotism is the President asleep at his desk. But after all, the principal is responsible for his agent. Hal Reid was only trying to earn the \$35,000 appropriated by the Republican National Committee for a film, which now stinks so they don't want to get within smelling distance of it. And they excuse themselves by saying they never knew it would be so rotten. The point is this—it wasn't too rotten if they could get away with it. They were caught in the act of trying to deny responsibility for it. Does any one believe that Hal Reid went ahead with the faked false film before he had had his scenario O. K'd by some one in authority at Republican Headquarters? Everett Colby's endorsement "It's a corker," is sufficient proof of this.

That it was in execrable taste or even treasonable—what was that to this crowd which has nothing to spend but money? The whole sordid affair is a fit parallel to the Rum, Romanism and Rebellion campaign which proved such a boomerang to the parties that started it. What can you expect of a party which campaigns on abuse, vilification, slander, innuendo and lies? We agree with the Brooklyn Eagle in wondering "if there was anything in this film that was not more than suggested by Colonel Roosevelt in his many attacks upon the President's Mexican policy? He has proclaimed President Wilson responsible for the conditions that he described. Others have done the same. In view of this why should the playwright be blamed for adapting the material to his medium? Can it be that the vilifiers of the President had to see these things on the screen before realizing how truly despicable this form of attack appears to most people? The exposure of the character of this putrid film should, says the Evening World, prove a sharp lesson to Republican campaign leaders. "The whole affair puts a stigma upon Republican campaign methods."
