## Is War Killing War?

The tyranny that all Europe, under the passion and pressure of war, is now voluntarily adopting would have caused revolution five years ago. Liberties dearly won are today lightly sacrificed and despotism is cheerfully embraced on the plea of necessity.

Prophecy is one of the most futile of all imaginings, but there are judgments as to the future, based upon the records of the past, which do not necessarily come under this heading. For the first time in the history of Europe, the causes, methods and results of a devastating general war will ultimately be passed upon by an enfranchised people.

In the most backward of the nations involved the inhabitants are no longer in complete darkness. They read and write. They have a voice in their government. Those who survive this struggle will not always be deceived as to its needlessness, its awful cost in life and treasure or as to the fearful hardships inflicted upon civilian populations. Comparing their own miseries with those of nations which they have been taught to hate, and viewing keenly every phase of the situation to see what has been gained and what lost in a struggle that probably can have no climax but exhaustion, there can hardly fail to be agreement in every country that such a war is useless as well as barbarous.

Every battlefield, every trench, every desolated town and province, every hospital, every prison camp, every woman and child forced into the work of men and every phase of hunger and deprivation is profoundly prophetic of a better day when the true lesson of this carnage will be understood and when all the hideous falsehoods by which strife is engendered and glorified will be nakedly revealed.

There will come a time, and soon, in all Christendom, when a man who even suggests war for any consideration save self-defense, and then only when all other measures fail, will be regarded not as a hero but as a scoundrel and a criminal. If Europe's years of agony lead to that great end, the sacrifice, even though prodigious, will not have been altogether in vain.—New York World.

## Financial Period Flood of Gold

creased 3 per cent. I admit 3 per cent is a lot, viewed as a sum, but we have grown too. I do not fear a heavy demand for gold in Europe after the war anyway. It wouldn't do Europe any good. It would come right back to us.

"And I don't fear a reversal of trade balance. Europe is stricken. Americans must help to build it up—America and American capital. As for 'dumping' of cheap articles here that will sell for less than we manufacture them, I don't fear that either. In the first place, Europe hasn't got the raw material," said Mr. Deacon. "Thousands of factories, it is true, now making munitions could be turned to making something else. But we've got to furnish the materials in many cases. If Europe could 'dump' goods on us, it would be wise for Europe to do it now, when those goods are bringing high prices. They would if they could, believe me.

"I do not mean to say that I am not afraid of the 'gold disaster' that leads to overconfidence in our finances and to flight loans based on top heavy calculations as to the nature of our prosperity. I am afraid of it, and I agree that we ought to extend foreign credits. It certainly will not hurt us. But I never will believe that we must go out and

make big loans just to get rid of our gold. If we cannot get rid of it safely we'll have to keep it and be careful."

Abstracts of Title Examined

"Neither alone nor any combination of fertilizers has been able to produce a fair yield of wheat without the help of lime," said Director C. E. Thorne regarding the value of lime on soil similar to that of the Ohio Experiment station at Wooster. This year manured land yielded 21 to 26 per cent more wheat where lime was applied. Another plot fertilized with nitrate of soda, acid phosphate and muriate of potash gave 21 per cent more wheat where lime than on unfertilized soil similarly fertilized. The yield on a plot receiving complete fertilizer with nitrogen in sulphate of ammonia gave 115 per cent increase in crop by application of lime.

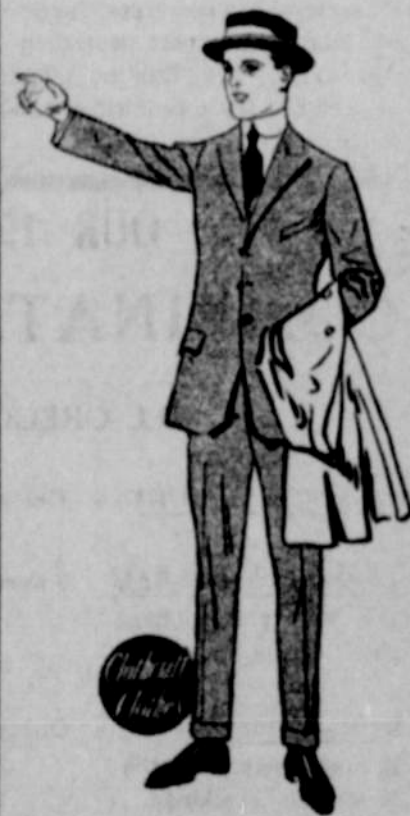
