Poisoning Squirrels

To begin with, the vital point for the user of squirrel poison to consider is the absolute importance of putting it out as early as possible—before the green sprouts of crops and spring vegetation appear.

If the poisoned grain is put out during the first warm dry days, results are certain. The squirrel is naturally very hungry, there being nothing else for him to eat and the poisoned grain being unwashed by rain, goes to him full strength.

It is necessary that the poisoned grain be put out in clear weather as the soluble coating of poison about the kernel of grain is rapidly washed away by rains.

Another strong argument for placing it out early is that if placed before the propagating season, it will eliminate a great multitude that would have to be poisoned later.
