## Munitions Men Ready

New York, Feb. 19.—Insofar as the "fundamental basis upon which emergency military and naval defense preparations must rest," the United States is "in far better position than any other has ever been in times of peace," in the opinion of Guy E. Tripp, chairman of the board of the Westinghouse Electric & Manufacturing Co. In a statement here today he said:

"So far as my knowledge goes, there are in this country greater facilities, already established, operated by large organizations having experience in the manufacture of munitions of war, than has ever before existed in any country not actually at war."

"In our own company alone we have facilities immediately available which have a proved capacity of 2000 six-inch high explosive shells a day, and there will be available on April 1 additional facilities with a proved capacity of 5000 eight-inch and 125 12-inch explosive shells a day."

in price during the year. Print paper which cost 4 cents one year ago now costs 8 cents. In fact it is difficult to point to anything which has not been marked up in price.

Now the European war has not caused all of this increase by any manner of means, for many things which are not effected by the war keeps pace on the upward climb.

Greedy dealers and manufacturers are taking advantage of conditions and advance prices, when there is no just cause to do so. Unless this greed is checked in some way, our government, like the governments over in Europe, will be forced to regulate prices.

There is still another reason for high prices, which many do not think about. The amount of money in a country regulates the price of its commodities. The United States now has more money than she ever had before, even during the Civil war when paper money was our only currency. We now have \$43.50 per capita. This is more money than ever circulated in any country since the days of Adam.
