kind providence made most of us Wilson men and women. We are all Americans and all hearts beat with the single impulse of loyalty and duty to the president."

Ex-Governor Oswald West was unable to get away at the last minute, but sent a telegram of regrets.

W. H. Hornbrook made a few brief remarks and he was followed by Lester W. Humphreys, of Portland, secretary of the state committee and the choice of Oregon democrats to succeed Mr. Hornbrook. He made an excellent impression.

State Senator Samuel M. Garland always a gifted speaker and eloquent orator, told of the forces holding the country together today. He said in part: "A serious thought has gripped the hearts of the people of Oregon and all thought of partisanship is banished. All only know patriotism and duty and uphold the hands of the president in the face of a world wide war. The president struck the chord in the heart of every true American when he opposed Germany. All forgot politics in the face of a common foe."

Col. Geo. P. Mimms, postmaster of Medford, boyhood schoolmate of Senator Garland, said that he comes from a country where every man is an orator and every fellow is brilliant on making a speech. The colonel entertained for a few minutes with funny stories and witty sayings.

The toastmaster called on D. P. Mason for a speech and in reply to the charge that he could not make a speech without talking about Geo. Chamberlain, proceeded to do that very thing and put another jewel in the crown of his old time friend.

Postmaster Frank S. Myers, of Portland, one of the most entertaining speakers of the evening, took good natured flings at several of the guests present and took special delight in exposing what he claimed to be the source of Milt A. Miller's speech.

Frank S. Ward, a former Linn county boy, but now of Salem, represented that section with a few words and a good story.

Postmaster Hugh McClain, of Marshfield, referred to America as the only great and powerful country in the world which is holding civilization together. His reference to Washington and Lincoln was warmly applauded.

Postmaster Victor Moses, of Corvallis, was called upon for a brief statement and then came Milt A. Miller's long expected address. After considerable joking he was able to get under way and made one of the best talks of the evening. He stated that all of the administrations for the past 50 years have not written as much good legislation as has the administration of Woodrow Wilson in the last four. He referred to the financial legislation, transportation, merchant marine, income tax, and other measures.

Fred Dawson, in the whiskers of Governor Withycombe, made an address as representing the governor, which greatly amused the crowd. The well known "O, my friends," of the governor, was repeated with effect. Then came Charles "Evasive" Hughes who expired when he heard the news of the California result and his will, read by Ed Baily, was one of the hits of the evening. Hughes was well impersonated by H. S. Logan.

Too much praise cannot be given to the members of the various committees in charge of the banquet and the other local democrats who assisted in making the affair a complete success.
