with the government committee that they surrendered. On the same day the United States court pronounced the Adamson law constitutional, showing that the court can act quick enough when an emergency arises. The decision could have been handed down before January 1 when all of the present trouble would have been avoided.

The railroad managers are manifesting a peculiar quality of patriotism. It is of the same quality as that manifested by the drafted man in time of war.

On the other hand, the men have shown a pure patriotic spirit. The Adamson law does not give them all they demanded last year, yet they submitted to what may be termed a compromise law. After they had decided to call the strike on to commence Saturday night and the war cloud loomed threateningly on the horizon, they notified President Wilson if there was to be war there would be no strike.

Certainly the Railway Brotherhood have manifested a more disinterested patriotism than have the railway managers. But all is well which ends well. The trouble is over and the trainmen have won the victory they deserve.

that he talked spiritualism to Mrs. Briggs and alleges that he obtained domination and control over her. It is also alleged that her mind is failing and that she now refuses to allow her children to come about her home.

Martin has been the recipient lately of threatening letters through the mail and one missive received by him through the mail was in the form of a cord tied in the form of a hangman's noose, indicating, according to the officers, that certain persons at West Stayton were on the point of doing him violence. After receiving these missives, Martin is said to have secured a revolver. Mack then had him arrested on a charge of carrying concealed weapons. The revolver is now in possession of Constable Varney. Federal authorities are investigating to ascertain the names of the person or persons who sent the noose and the threatening letters through the mail.

When an officer started to West Stayton yesterday to serve the citation on Mrs. Briggs, he met her and Martin coming to Salem to obtain a marriage license. Issuance of the license was held up for a time after their arrival, but the license was issued late yesterday afternoon and the couple was immediately married.
