boat or forced it to beat a retreat.

As the detector reported the submarine by the sound of the boats propellers, German scientists concentrated their efforts upon building ships which would be practically noiseless. They have succeeded.

The result of their success has been to change to some extent and to make more difficult of solution the problem which faces the allies, including the United States.
