All of the big daily papers in Portland are supporting the road bond issue. The reason is obvious self interest. Multnomah county, having about one-third of the wealth of the state has, compared with the agricultural counties, but a small road mileage. On this account she is enabled to place her highways in fine condition, even paving her main thoroughfares. The Tribune has no fault to find with this fact. We congratulate our smallest and richest county that she has the money to spend in order to secure this, result. But we do not think it quite fair for our metropolis to attempt to force counties with a very much larger road mileage and with not a tenth part of the population she has, to undertake like road improvements. She has set a pace far bevond the ability of the other counties of the state to follow.

Columbia, Clatsop and Hood River counties have tried to follow the pace with failure and practically bankruptcy as the result. June 5 will be a very important day to many people in Oregon. On that day every man of 21 to 30 years of age, inclusive, must register. Sick or well, ablebodied or overloading ourselves with debt, the crippled, married or single, all must register, under a penalty of jail imprisonment. If you are entitled to exemption for any cause, that fact will be set forth in your examination by the registering officer, whose report will be sent to the war department. There the exemption will be made and those who are liable for service, their names will be placed in a wheel or box and from whence the names to answer the first call for 500,000 men will be drawn.
