ANARCHISTS DRAW 2 YEARS IN PRISON

Emma Goldman and A. Berkman Must
Pay \$10,000 Fine and May
Be Deported

New York, July 9.—Emma Goldman and Alexander Berkman, anarchists, convicted here tonight of conspiracy to obstruct operation of the selective draft law, started for prison in the custody of Federal Marshals a few hours after the verdict had been returned.

Berkman will be taken to the Federal penitentiary at Atlanta, Ga., and Miss Goldman to the state penitentiary at Jefferson City, Mo. Each was sentenced by Federal Judge Mayer to the maximum penalty of two years imprisonment and to pay a fine of \$10,000.
