TEUTON OFFENSIVE DECLARED WEAKENING

Russians Inflict Heavy Losses on Foe and Stem Tide of Invasion.

Petrograd.—In consequence of the heavy losses inflicted on the Austro-German forces and the desperate resistance of the Russians, says a telegram received here from Odessa, the Teuton offensive on the Roumanian front is diminishing in intensity.

Desperate engagements are being fought by the Russo-Roumanian forces and Austro-German armies along the Roumanian front. In the center of this battle line, according to the Russian official statement, the Russians and Roumanians repulsed strong Teuton attacks along the Fokshani-Marsch railroad, then counter attacked and captured 1200 Germans, only to retire later in the evening.

In southwestern Moldavia the Russians took the offensive, smashed the Teuton lines and captured a number of prisoners and four guns.

In western Moldavia the Austro-Germans, after battles of great intensity, forced the Roumanians to retire to Ocna.

In the course of a battle south of the River Pruth, on the frontier of Roumania and Bukovina, the Russians entered the town of Lukovica and took prisoner 200 officers and men. The Russians also captured 200 Austro-Germans and took three machine guns by wresting a height in that region from the enemy.

The Russian war office report announced that the Austro-Germans attacked in dense waves near the village of Zarkov, southwest of Brody, in northeastern Galicia. The statement adds that the Teuton offensive in the Zarkov region completely failed, with heavy losses.

William M. Hilleary, of Brownsville, commander of the Oregon Volunteer Veterans' association and ex-master of the Oregon state grange, died at Albany at the age of 77.

Out of the 104 students who graduated from the Corvallis high school only 70 were able to be present, the rest having either enlisted in the army or navy or been released to boost along the food preparedness campaign.

The bean crop of Linn county in 1917 will be 1700 per cent greater than that of 1916. The pork failed to keep pace with the beans, however, for hogs shows a 20 per cent decrease in number from those in the county last year.

NET CLOSING ABOUT LENS

Lines Are Drawn Closer to Center of the City.

London.—Another forward movement to the southwest of Lens has been made with a minimum loss. For the best part of two weeks in the Cite Du Moulin our patrols and those of the enemy have been living an uneasy life almost side by side, with only a few tumble-down walls between them. Small attacking parties set out from that part of the Cite Du Moulin already in our hands and drove in the enemy's patrols along a front of more than 1000 yards. The Germans for the most part scuttled back toward Lens, but a number were caught under our fire and killed. A new outpost line was established and prepared for a counter-attack. No counter-attack had been made up to the time of filing this dispatch.

This advance carries the Canadians well within 1000 yards of the center of Lens on the western front of the city. At Aviation and Leuville on the south front, our outposts are now about a mile from the center and in the northwest sector, opposite St. Laurent, our line is a scant 1500 yards from the heart of Lens. The net is fast closing.

8-HOUR BILL INTRODUCED

Would Apply to Plants Whose Products Go into Interstate Commerce.

Washington.—Many petitions from western states asking congress to take some action to check I. W. W. activities were presented in the senate. The comment which accompanied their presentation showed clearly that senators were seriously thinking of means to remedy the situation.

Senator Poindexter referred to petitions he had received from the Clear water Lumber company and its employees in his state, in which the employees said they did not want to strike, but were threatened with violence by the I. W. W. should they not do so. Both the company and the employees the Washington senator said, were agreed on the principle of the eight hour day in lumber camps. He introduced a bill establishing an eight-hour day for all lumbering and wood-working plants whose products find their way into interstate commerce.

EUROPEAN WAR NEWS

German attacks on the Alane front have been withstood successfully by the French.

Further progress has been made by the French northwest of Bixchoote on the Flanders battle front, says the British official report.

All of Galicia, with the exception of a narrow stretch of ground from Brody to Zharaz, northeast of Tarnopol, has been wrested from the Russians.

The Russian political situation has become calmer. Premier Kerensky has withdrawn his resignation and there are continued indications of the strengthening of the morale of the Russian armies on the southwestern front.

In the operations at Lens the Canadians pushed forward to a depth of about 200 yards to a line between the Lens-Grenay railway and the Cite Du Moulin, directly south, and since have consolidated their positions among the buildings.

The Austro-German armies on the eastern front are continuing their advance between the Dniester and the Pruth and in Bukovina, east and south of Czernowitz, taking additional towns, according to German army headquarters report.

C. A. Harris, 44 years old, an employee of the Willamette Valley Lumber company, at Black Rock, fell 40 feet from a bridge, receiving injuries from which he died.

The excavation at the Port of Astoria grounds for the new million-bushel bulk grain bins is about complete and work is in progress driving the foundation piling.

Representative Hawley has urged Secretary Lane to expedite issuance of patent to the state of Oregon for the Saddle Mountain park transferred by a recent act of congress.

Official announcement was made by Governor Withycombe that on November 1 Chester A. Moores, of Portland, will assume the duties of private secretary to the governor, to succeed George Palmer Putman, who resigned recently.

C. E. Coe, superintendent of the Roseburg Indian office, announces that he is making plans to hold a sale of Indian allotments on September 25. The lands to be sold are located in northern California, Curry county and central Oregon.
