Poison For Grasshoppers

There has been some complaint of grasshoppers eating the beans and other crops. To prevent this, use the poison bran-mesh. The formula for preparing is set out below:

25 pounds of coarse bran, half a pound of Paris green or White Arsenic, half a pound of salt, two or three lemons, (or 2 oz. of lemon extract). Squeeze the juice out of the lemons on the bran and chop them up fine and add them. Use enough water to make a dry mash but don't make it sloppy. Some advocate adding about half a pint of syrup to the above.

You should sow broadcast 10 or 12 pounds to the acre, putting it on early in the morning before the dew is off the grass.
