FRENCH ADVANCE ON 11-MILE FRONT

Paris.—A smashing French victory on the Verdun front is recorded in the official report issued by the war office. The French have captured the enemy defenses on both sides of the Meuse over a front of more than 11 miles, penetrating the German line at divers points to a depth of a mile and a quarter.

More than 5000 unwounded German prisoners have been taken.

Notable among the captured positions are the Avocourt wood, two summits of Le Mort Homme, the Corbeaux wood and Champneuville, all of which were held, notwithstanding vicious counter attacks by the Germans, which were broken up by the French fire with heavy casualties to the enemy. French airmen materially aided the infantry in the press forward, swooping low over the German forces and firing their machine guns into the ranks and in flights in the air with German protecting machines, eleven of which were sent hurtling to the ground.

NEED HARD BLOWS TO WIN

Pershing Deplores Lukewarm Attitude of American People Toward War.

Paris.—Major-General Pershing, the American commander, in an interview, stated that the war can be won only by hard and forceful blows delivered by a well-trained American army working in conjunction with the allied armies.

Deploping the lukewarmness of the American people in regard to the war, General Pershing added:

"Every man, woman and child should support the administration in its determination to arm and equip the American army and to keep up its morale and that of the allied armies. This war will not be won by talk nor by subscribing to the Red Cross. The American people must come to a full realization of what the war means. It can be won only by striking hard and forceful blows, not otherwise."

Allies to Confer on Pope's Offers.

London.—The allies will not reply to the peace appeal of Pope Benedict until after consultation in which all the entente powers will have a part. At the same time there is some disposition in certain quarters to leave the answer to President Wilson.

National Secretary of Socialists Held.

Chicago.—Adolph Germer, national secretary of the socialist party, recently arrested and later released, has been rearrested on a charge of having violated the espionage law by making a public speech against conscription.

Canada Keeps Flour From U. S.

Ottawa, Ont.—Exportation of flour to the United States is prohibited through an order in council, issued at the instance of the Canadian food controller.

Take Villages on Caucasian Front.

Petrograd.—The Russians have taken the offensive on the Caucasian front and have occupied a series of villages, the war office announced.

EUROPEAN WAR NEWS

A total of 114 German airplanes have been brought down during the past week in fierce sky fighting that has been in progress in connection with the allied offensive.

The French and Italians have started monster offensives—the French against the Germans near Verdun and the Italians against the Austrians from the region of Plava to near the headwaters of the Adriatic sea.

There has been a considerable stiffening in the front in Roumania and also in Russia in the region of Vilna. South of Grozehti, southern Moldavia, the Russians have made a stand against attacks of the teutonic allies and repulsed them.

Both the British and French continue to make sallies at various points and to strengthen the positions won in the recent fighting in Flanders. The Canadians around Lens daily are biting further into the German line and now have the coal center virtually surrounded.

The airmen of the allies are working havoc with the German flyers and on German works far behind the lines. In aerial raids the allied machines have bombarded numerous towns, railway stations and cantonments, the raids extending as far as Selraete, near the Dutch border, 18 miles from Ghent, which also received a visitation.

In Roumania the Austro-Germans have forced back the Roumanians on both sides of the Oltuz and Trotus valleys, according to the Berlin official communication. In the former sector more than 1500 Roumanians and 30 machine guns fell into the hands of the invaders, while in fighting on the Sereth river 2000 additional prisoners were taken.

Lovett in Control of Transportation.

Washington.—Government control of the coal industry moved a step nearer when President Wilson formally named Robert S. Lovett, of the war industries board, director of priority of transportation and approved an order issued by Judge Lovett directing that rail and steamship lines give bituminous coal shipments to the northwest preference over all other freight movements.

Bernstorff Sent to Turkey.

Amsterdam.—Count von Bernstorff, the former German ambassador to the United States, has been appointed, according to the Berlin Vossische Zeitung, to represent Germany at Constantinople.

Hogs Are \$23 in Chicago.

Chicago.—Hogs sold for \$20 a hundred pounds here Tuesday.

Montana Has No Trouble.

Butte, Mont.—So far as officials of the United States attorney's office here have ascertained the I. W. W. strike of agricultural and construction laborers in this state has not interfered with work in any Montana community.

Strike Fails to Materialize in Oregon.

Portland, Or.—The so-called "general strike" of I. W. W. members resulted just as expected. It was a complete failure. So far as the civil and military authorities could learn not a single man obeyed the strike order.

All Idaho Reported Quiet.

Boise, Idaho.—"No disturbance" was the tenor of reports received by Governor Moses Alexander from every section of Idaho on the Industrial Workers of the World situation.

Defense Council Favors Eight Hours.

Tacoma, Wash.—The state council of defense, at a meeting here presided over by Dr. Henry Suzzallo, adopted a resolution calling upon congress to establish a national eight-hour day in the lumber industry.

Ex-Senator Kern Dead.

Asheville, N. C.—Ex-Senator John W. Kern, of Indiana, and democratic nominee for vice president in 1908, died here of uremic poisoning. He was 68 years old.

Fear growers of Douglas county have appealed to the Eugene Fruit-grower's association to aid them in conserving their crop this year.

Ed Wright, of La Grande, has been appointed by the Oregon public service commission as secretary to succeed Edward Ostrander, who resigned August 1.

Liberty Bread Replaces War Bread.

Washington.—It is not "war bread" any more. The food administration has applied the name "Liberty Bread" to substitutes for wheat flour.
