BRIEF WAR NEWS

More than 1200 prisoners, a number of guns and large stores were captured on Dago island, the German war office announces.

Pressure of overwhelming German naval and landing forces has forced Russian relinquishment of Moon island to the Germans, the Russian war office announced.

There has been brisk fighting between the Italians and Austrians in the Trentino region and along the Julian front on the Austro-Italian theater, and between the entente forces and teutonic allies in Macedonia.

Advices from Switzerland say the people of Strassburg, Metz and other points in Alsace-Lorraine responded with a general outburst of anti-German feeling to attempts to float part of the new German war loan and celebrate the birthday of Von Hindenburg.

Highly successful operations in the neighborhood of Poelcapelle and, in conjunction with the French, south of Houtholst forest, are reported in the communication from Field Marshal Haig. The whole of the objectives, including many strong points, were captured.

The Germans have captured in its entirety the island of Dago, lying at the southwestern entrance to the Gulf of Finland, and also the island of Schildau, situated between Moon island and the Esthonia coast in the Gulf of Finland. Several hundred prisoners were taken on Dago island.

AUSTRIAN MINISTER ASKS GERMAN TERMS

London.—The Deutsche Tages Zeitung of Berlin, as quoted in an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Amsterdam, says that Count Czernin, Austro-Hungarian foreign minister, recently requested the German chancellor, Dr. Michaelis, to state Germany's peace terms, urging that Germany make concessions in the west. Count Czernin received a vague reply, whereupon he stated that he could no longer negotiate with Dr. Michaelis, inasmuch as the chancellor made vague statements when clearness and frankness were imperatively necessary.

These statements of the Tages Zeitung are not denied, the dispatch says, and have made a great sensation, being particularly illustrative of the fervent desire for peace on the part of Austria.

German Casualties Are 8,250,000.

Amsterdam.—The Cologne correspondent of the Tijd reports that the German casualties list, comprising killed, wounded, prisoners and missing, from August, 1914, to September, 1917, fill 30 folio volumes of 22,000 pages. He calculates the total number of names as 8,250,000.

15 German Battleplanes Shot Down.

London.—Fifteen German airplanes were brought down by British aviators in recent fighting over the battle area in northern France, says the official statement on aviation, issued by the war office. Eight British machines are reported missing.

Scandinavians Roused by Attack.

London.—A joint Scandinavian protest is expected to be lodged against the German sinking of the neutral steamers under convoy in the North sea last week, according to a dispatch to the Morning Post from Stockholm.

New Oregon Adjutant-General.

Salem, Or.—Governor Withycombe announced that he would appoint Col. one John M. Williams, of Eugene, as acting adjutant-general for Oregon to take the place of Adjutant-General George A. White, who expects to leave at once to enter active service.

Politics Permitted in Military Camps

Washington.—The war department has issued orders to allow representatives of political parties to campaign in the various military camps so long as they do not interfere with the discipline of the soldiers.

OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week Briefly Sketched for Information of Our Readers.

Property owners on the bottom lands west of Rainier have formed a drainage district and will reclaim about 1500 acres that are flooded every summer.

Portland's servant girls are preparing to form a union for the uplifting of their craft and for the improvement of conditions under which they work.

No hope for immediate relief in the car shortage in this state is held out in a telegram received by the public service commission from Commissioner F. J. Miller.

The 49th annual convention of Oregon Baptists is being held this week at The Dalles, beginning Monday evening and continuing through Friday afternoon.

The Oregon Irrigation Securities company has certified the issue of \$225,000 bonds by the Payette-Oregon Slope irrigation district of Idaho and eastern Oregon.

At the meeting of the state highway commission, scheduled for November 8, bids will be opened for the grading of the section of the Columbia river highway between Hood River and Mosier, which it is estimated will cost \$352,324.

The law exempting miners from assessment work on their claims for the years 1917 and 1918 is now in effect. The law was enacted in order that claimants could enter the Government service or devote their time to war-sustaining vocations.

At the regular meeting of the state highway commission in November, contracts probably will be let for \$600,000 worth of construction which will extend over into next year. This amount added to what has been contracted for already this year will bring the grand total up to approximately \$2,400,000.

Hood River county has just completed two new bridges over Hood river, one at Trout creek and the other at Dee, at a cost of approximately \$10,000.

A meeting of representatives of all the farmers' unions of Polk county will be held in Dallas October 17 for the purpose of discussing the question of a county agent.

Senator Chamberlain is advised by the director of the geological survey, that a geologist has been instructed to visit Polk county and inspect reported oil and gas indications.

At a meeting held at Toledo the proposition to bond the port to build a steam schooner for the lumber and freight-carrying business of Yaquina bay was voted down by a vote of 7 to 25.

The annual state convention of the Oregon Congress of Mother and Parent-Teacher associations of Oregon will be held at Eugene this week, beginning Wednesday and closing Saturday.

Representative Willis C. Hawley has announced a competitive examination to establish a register for eligible young men for appointment to the United States military and naval academies.

Miss Elizabeth Fox, dean of women at the university of Oregon, has been named as the Oregon executive in the war work campaign being carried on by the North American student movement.

An inspection of 30,000 acres of land between Hermiston and Umatilla as a possible site for one of the additional army training camps has been ordered by the commanding officers of the western division.

Test For Butter.

Here is a test for butter so simple that any housewife can put it into successful practice: A clean piece of white paper is smeared with a little of the suspected butter. The paper is then rolled up and set on fire. If the butter is pure the smell of the burnt paper is rather pleasant, but the odor is distinctly tallowy if the "butter" is made up wholly or in part of animal fat.—Chicago News.
