Ed Pepperlings Mourn

The sad intelligence reached The Tribune that two of Ed Pepperlings little children died of cholera infantum, last week. Also, that a baby of a neighbor died of the same complaint. Two more of the Pepperling children are sick with the same complaint and the mother has had an attack of the cholera morbus which is practically the same disease.

The sickness of the children is extremely virulent. Drs. Prill and Potter, of Scio and Dr. Booth, of Lebanon, all agree upon the diagnosis of the disease, but say it is extremely virulent, the worst in the history of their practice.

Dr. Prill has small hope of saving the two children yet living, especially the older girl. The baby seems to be holding its own at the present writing (Monday) and the older girl seemed some better at the time of this report. Mr. and Mrs. Pepperling have the sympathy of the people of Scio in their bereavement and, we hope, that the messenger of death may not visit their home again, especially at the present time.

raising over three feet high, but at every trench or hole it stops and can be driven away by building a fire. Five pounds of wood will clear a space 10x10x20 feet of the gas. Let them shoot their gas, we'll get their goat or die trying.

We get weather reports from France daily and it is about the same as it is here. By the way, the government is going to pay the soldiers half their months pay now, and the rest when we get out of the service. If we take liberty bonds we get 4 per cent interest with the privilege of selling them then. I took \$200 worth and will send you the receipts. You have to take the bonds as they keep the money anyway. The reason is the boys in France are spending their money foolishly. This way, when the war is over they will have something. I preferred having mine drawing 4% interest. If I am killed the government will send you the money.

Friday is to be another physical examination and only the most fit of the soldiers go to France, the rest go to their home state to do guard duty with the exception of those who have weak hearts and lungs, they will be discharged. I do not know whether I will cross the pond or not but I sure want to do my part in this war and I feel if I go I will come back. When we crossed the Mississippi valley we saw some fine sights. As we got glimpses of the Gulf of Mexico, we could see many ships. Thousands of ducks were flying over head with once in a while an alligator in the streams. Army life is sure healthy. We have fine eats, good warm blankets and the best of clothes.
