GERMANS RETREAT FROM AISNE FRONT

Paris.—France won a great and bloodless victory in a sweeping advance following a German retreatment from all of the Chemin des Dames line between the Oise and Aisne canal on the west.

The captures of the French soldiers since September 23, it was officially announced, have totaled 200 heavy guns, 220 trench mortars and 720 machine guns. In 10 days, from October 21 to 30, 23 German airplanes were brought down and 28 forced to descend badly damaged.

The German retreatment and the resultant French advance brings the envelopment of Laon, key city in the Hindenburg-Siegfried line, very close. The city is now less than seven miles distant from the new French lines—within range of heavy guns.

The ridges of the Chemin des Dames have cost the German crown prince almost as many men as did his assaults against Verdun and as with the French citadel, have gained him nothing. His present retreatment was a foregone conclusion when the French bored in the corner at the extreme westward end of the Chemin des Dames, threatening his flank.

Army Liberty Loan Subscriptions Big.

Washington.—The American army has subscribed to \$39,373,650 worth of liberty bonds, it was announced by Colonel H. M. Lord, quartermaster corps, in charge of the army liberty loan campaign.

"Americans Captured" Says Berlin.

Berlin.—"North American soldiers were taken prisoner in reconnoitering by our forces on the Rhine and Marne canal," an official statement declared.

British Again Are Advancing in West.

London.—Field Marshal Haig struck another tremendous blow at the German lines around Passchendaele ridge. "Satisfactory progress," was reported in his early statement.

Charles B. Croso died suddenly at Toledo. He was 73 years old and had been prominent in state and county politics for many years.

October was an exceptionally dry month in Astoria. The records show that the total rainfall during the month was but 1.25 inches.

During the month of October the state industrial accident commission sent out 3028 pay warrants to injured workmen and for hospital fees.

During the month of October 1225 automobiles were licensed by Secretary of State Olcott, and the total for the ten months of this year is \$8,312.

Governor Withycombe has appointed Thomas Nelson of Astoria a member of the state board of pilot commissioners to succeed Edward C. Judd, resigned.

Work on the fish dam 20 miles up the north Umpqua river from Roseburg, has been abandoned by the state, owing to the inability to secure the needed men.

Judge J. C. Moreland, clerk of the supreme court, announced that out of 15 who took the examination for admission to the bar at Salem October 3, six failed.

Farm and garden and general produce raised at the Oregon state hospital for the 10 months from January 1 to October 31 this year amounted to \$87,943.73.

Mrs. A. M. La Follette, wife of State Senator La Follette, of Marion county, died at the Salem hospital from the effects of a stroke of paralysis. She was 70 years old.

The per capita cost at the state penitentiary has increased from \$21.33 in January when there were 486 inmates, to \$28.46 in October, when there were 341 inmates.

Plans for the immediate erection of a large planing mill at Wendling and the gradual electrification of the Wendling plant of the Booth-Kelly Lumber company were announced.

State Fire Marshal Wells has issued a warning about fires from defective flues and chimneys. He urges all citizens to make an inspection of their flues and chimneys and avoid possible loss.

It was indicated at a meeting of the state tax commission, sitting as a board of equalization, that the assessed valuation of both the Southern Pacific and O. W. R. & N. Co.'s properties probably will be reduced slightly.

For a month the Forest Grove school board has experimented with a cafeteria, furnishing a noonday hot lunch for the pupils and teachers at cost. The result of the first month's experience has proved highly successful.

DECREASE OF GERMAN POWER IS EVIDENCED

Paris.—When General Petain rocked the German line with his uppercut to the jaw on the Chemin des Dames, the German command had to rake the whole western front to assemble reinforcements and bolster up the tottering sector.

A census of prisoners revealed that the reinforcements were collected not in units or divisions, but in such small military fragments as companies and battalions. And those companies and battalions were identified as of regiments widely scattered along the whole western line.

There was evidence of Germany's dwindling manpower when a tour through the prisoners' cages showed a majority of those captured by the French were boys—mere youths of the 1918 class.

Petain's victory liberates Soissons from all possible menace of a German grip.

The French troops are continuing their successful drive on the Flanders front, according to the war office statement. The number of guns captured since October 23 total 160, and many prisoners have been taken.

BRIEF WAR NEWS

Field Marshal Haig's men have hampered their way still further into the German lines in Flanders.

On the Russian front the Germans in their continued evacuation have withdrawn from the entire Werder peninsula, projecting into Moon sound, in the gulf of Riga.

The Belgians and the French have captured several important salients in the region of Dixmude. Along the Aisne front the French are violently bombarding the German posts.

Further advance by Russian troops in the Riga sector, following German evacuation of a great section of ground formerly held by the enemy was announced in a Russian official statement.

Great Britain and France are preparing to lend immediate aid to Italy, and the possibility is that already troops are being hastened across the western Italian frontier and by way of Turin and Milan to the battle front in the east.

In their reverses of the past few days on the Isonzo front the Italians have lost ground that it had taken them the better part of two years to gain. Goritz, which the teutonic forces have recaptured, had been taken only recently by the forces of General Cadorna, but Cliviale, to the west of the Isonzo river, which also has fallen to Mackensen, is on Italian soil.

Italy's mettle is being critically tested by the tremendous teutonic drive on the Isonzo front under command of Emperor Charles, of Austria. Apparently virtually the entire Austrian army and strong German forces are pitted against the Italians. Berlin claims the defeat of this section of the Italian forces, from which it announces the capture of 100,000 men and 700 guns.

Italians Checking Teutonic Advance.

Rome.—Italians are checking the advance of the Austro-German troops into the plains of northern Italy, the war office announces.

PENINSULA IS EVACUATED

Withdrawal Indicates Defeat of Plan to March Against Russian Capital.

Petrograd.—The Germans have evacuated the Werder peninsula, on the gulf of Riga, where they made a landing recently, the war office announces.

Evacuation by the Germans of Werder peninsula indicates the definite failure of the apparent intention of the Berlin war office to send an army against Petrograd.

This action leaves the net result of the recent German campaign in the gulf of Riga and adjacent waters the occupation by teuton forces of the several islands in the gulf, which has cost them 16 warships, sunk in the campaign, two of them being modern.

Russia Reiterates Sincerity in War.

Petrograd.—Russia is still doing her utmost to carry on the war. She will continue to do her duty. These are the views of Premier Kerensky, whose secretary, in his name, protested against any other interpretation of his recent interview.
