TEUTONS ADVANCE IN NORTHERN ITALY

Venice Will Fall If Austro-Germans Break Through Italian Line.

Rome.—The struggle between the Austro-Germans and Italians on Monte Tomba and Monte Monfenera, in the mountainous region of northern Italy, continues, it was officially announced by the Italian war department. The invading forces were driven back four times when they attempted to take the Italian positions on the Monfenera spur.

Italian possession of Venice and the security of the Piave line depend apparently on the outcome of the desperate battle now in progress between the Piave and Brenta rivers. The Austro-Germans are attacking heavily and are advancing against the stout resistance of the Italians.

The Italians are defending each position, but the Germans have advanced several miles here within the past few days and seemingly are attempting to drive a wedge between the Italians in the region of Asiago and those along the Piave. Monte Tomba is on the western side of the Piave six miles northwest of Vidor.

The Austro-Germans are exerting very strong pressure here and are reported to have brought up Austrian troops from the eastern front and to have transferred General von Below's army to this sector.

Around Asiago the Italians have checked the Germans and have been successful in offensive operations. Defeated in strong efforts to cross the Piave between Vidor and the Adriatic sea, the Austro-Germans have ceased their attempts. The artillery fire along the river, however, is very violent.

No Loafing in Lincoln, Neb.

Lincoln, Neb.—Under orders of the mayor of Lincoln, the police of the city are accosting every man who does not appear to be busy, and unless assurance is received that the persons addressed are employed, they are either supplied with work or urged forcibly to get out of town.

Oklahoma Clan Tars 17 I. W. W.

Tulsa, Okla.—A band of men garbed in long black robes and wearing masks seized 17 members of the I. W. W., took them to the edge of the city and administered lashes and a coat of tar and feathers, after which the I. W. W. were started toward the Osage hills.

More Wooden Ships May Be Ordered.

Washington.—Oregon and Washington shipyards are expected to receive further big orders for wooden vessels as a result of the shakeup in the emergency fleet corporation, which is likely to result in the official decapitation of Admiral Capps.

The 12th annual Western Oregon Older Boys' conference, under the direction of the interstate executive committee of the Young Men's Christian association of Oregon and Idaho, will be held in Eugene November 30 and December 1 and 2.

The first organized effort to drain the Long Tom swamps, northwest of Eugene, were put on foot with the filing of articles of incorporation of the Neighbors Drainage Co-operative association. The objects as stated are to construct, operate and maintain a system to drain all the wet, swamp and overflowed land west of the Long Tom creek.

Paving work on the Sheridan road, which was being done by the state highway department, has been closed down because of inability to get cars for supplying gravel.

Eastern Oregon's first annual marksmen's tournament will be held at Enterprise November 28 and 29, under the auspices of the Wallawa County Rod and Gun club.

Dispatches from Ottawa include in the list of casualties the name of Captain G. I. Mitchell, an American, of Portland, who died of wounds received on the front in France.

United States senator McNary telegraphed to Food Administrator Hoover declaring that the farmers of Oregon are suffering a material loss from the present situation concerning wheat and asking for relief.

After the installation of hundreds of thousands of dollars' worth of modern apparatus, an additional boat and numerous other improvements, Portland's bureau of fire, according to a report just issued by the national board of fire underwriters, is less efficient than it was in 1918.

BRIEF WAR NEWS

The conference of British, French and Italian representatives has resulted in the creation of a permanent inter-allied military committee under Generals Foch, Wilson and Cadorna, to sit at Versailles.

Advices from Petrograd are that the revolutionists have been defeated. In Petrograd street fighting has taken place, with the Cossacks and other loyalists having the better of the Bolshevik element, while Kerensky with 200,000 men is on his way from Gatchina to reinforce the loyalists.

The British army in Palestine, pursuing the defeated Turks, has made further extensive gains. Askalon has been occupied. With the occupation of Askalon, British forces have described a half circle around the holy city of Jerusalem. At Hebron the British are only 20 miles distant from the shrine of all Christians and Jews.

On the Italian front the Italian line on the north has stiffened under the reinforcements it has received from the British and French. The German official communication admits that east of Asiago, where the Austro-Germans made gains last week, the Italians in strong force attacked the invaders and recaptured lost positions.

General Greene Asked to Give Facts.

Seattle, Wash.—By a vote of 5 to 4 the Seattle city council adopted a resolution requesting Major General H. A. Greene, commanding the Camp Lewis cantonment, to submit evidence substantiating his charge that a vice syndicate with "men high in authority involved" is operating in this city, making it an unsafe place for soldiers to visit.

Prohibition Defeated in Ohio.

Cincinnati.—Prohibition has been defeated in Ohio by a majority of 1723 votes, according to official returns from all counties.

Women Arrested for Picketing Wilson

Washington.—Forty-one members of the National Woman's party were arrested at the two front gates of the white house for picketing.

FLYERS JOIN U. S. ARMY

Lafayette Flying Corps Transferred by French.

American Field Headquarters in France.—All American aviators now fighting in the French army have been formally commissioned officers in the United States army aviation service. The famous Lafayette escadrille of Americans was included.

Some of the new American flyers will continue temporarily with their present commands and under French direction until they are called upon for active service with the American expeditionary forces. A great many airmen, however, will join the American colors at once.

The transfer of this big body of aerial fighters gives the United States a nucleus of veterans of the air which will be of incalculable advantage when the American forces get into action.

Workmen are putting the finishing touches on Hendrick's hall at the University of Oregon, a three story brick building to be utilized as the women's dormitory.

Yamhill county has the largest silo in the state. M. W. Patton, of Chehalis valley, this year built a silo 20 feet in diameter and 54 feet high, holding 400 tons.

The Hammond Lumber company has purchased from the Minnesota & Oregon Land & Timber company a tract of 1640 acres of fir timber lying in the eastern part of Clatsop county.

Mrs. Eliza Spalding Warren, Whitman Indian massacre survivor and said to be the first white child born west of the Rocky mountains, celebrated her 80th birthday at Brownsville.

With a view of being prepared to do paving work on force account next year, the state highway commission, has called for bids on asphaltic paving plants. The bids are to be opened November 27.

About 35,000 Chinook salmon eggs from the central hatchery at Bonneville have been placed in the Oregon Agricultural college hatcheries. They will be used to help develop the fisheries industries.

The city of Portland has received a bid of \$5.60 a ton for waste foodstuffs now being burned at the municipal garbage incinerator. It is the purpose to sell these foodstuffs to feed hogs and other animals.

Eight women are employed in the plant of the Springfield Planing Mill company at Springfield, and the proprietors of the mill have found the experiment such a success that it is probable more will be employed.
