West Scio a Busy Place

The railroad boys say that West Scio is the busiest point on the Woodburn-Springfield line. It takes about one-half hour to take off and on the express matter carried. 200 to 250 cans of milk or empty cans are handled every day, morning and evening.

The Scio condenser has become the leading manufacture industry of Linn county. About \$1000 is the price paid for each day's milk receipts, besides what is paid out to 40 to 50 hands employed.

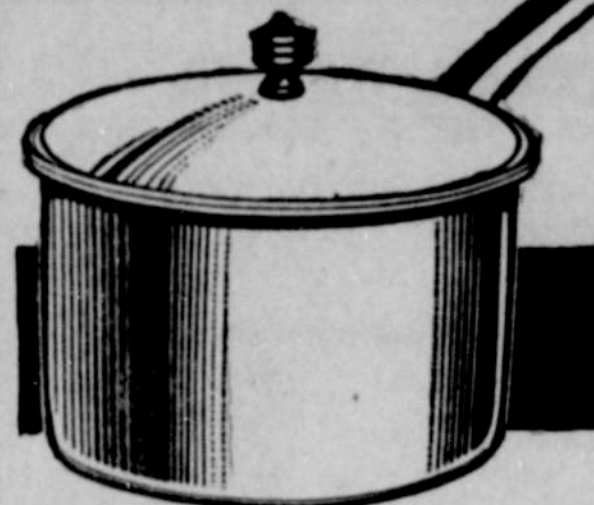

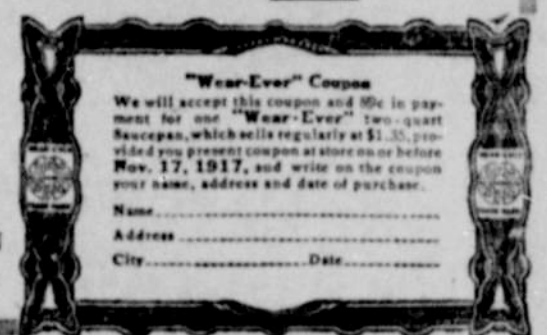
