OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week
Briefly Sketched for Infor-
mation of Our Readers.

The Halsey high school has organ-
ized a band of 23 pieces.

Twelve thousand turkeys were ship-
ped from Douglas county last week.

R. R. Lloyd, Forest Grove, was list-
ed as killed in action in a Canadian
casualty list.

The annual meeting of the Oregon
Sportsmen's league will be held in
Portland December 9 and 10.

J. A. Churchill, state superintendent
of public instruction, will be a candi-
date for re-election, he has announced.

The Northwest Hereford Breeders'
association was organized at a ban-
quet of Hereford breeders at Portland.

Dangerous weed seeds not common
in Oregon have been found in Minne-
sota No. 2 oats shipped into the state
recently.

A three-day chautauqua will be held
in Sherwood, beginning on Thursday,
November 29, and ending Saturday,
December 1.

A campaign has been started at
Lakeview by members of the St. Pat-
rick's church to raise funds to build
a modern hospital.

Identification cards will be provided
all state officials entitled to exemp-
tion under the law from the present
transportation tax.

Bruce Dennis, state director of the
state council of defense, urges the
appointment of a county agent in ev-
ery county in Oregon.

Frank J. Miller, chairman of the
public service commission, has an-
nounced his candidacy for re-election
as a member of that commission.

The Oregon state swimming and
diving championships will be held at
the Multnomah Amateur Athletic club
in Portland Saturday night, January
12.

The sale of Red Cross Christmas
seals for the Oregon Association for
the Prevention of Tuberculosis will
be held from December 1 until Christ-
mas.

The work on the Latham Divide
road near Cottage Grove, which takes
the place of several miles of the worst
road on the Pacific highway, will be
completed this week.

Succumbing to a stroke of apoplexy,
J. L. Stockton, an old-time merchant
of Salem and a former president of
the Oregon Retail Merchants' associa-
tion, died at the age of 70.

Mrs. Mary Jane Hemenway, who
crossed the plains to Oregon with her
parents in 1853, died at her home in
Eugene at the age of 67 years after
an illness of several months.
Jabez Wilkes, pioneer of 1845, veter-
an of the Indian wars and a resident
of Washington county practically con-
tinuously for 70 years, died at his
home in Hillsboro, aged 85 years.

Plowing and sowing fall grain is
still progressing throughout Linn
county, with the result that the large-
est acreage of fall grain is now plant-
ed in recent years in the Willamette
valley.

A meeting of the Pacific coast con-
ference has been called for December
3 by Dr. A. D. Brown, of Oregon Agri-
cultural college, secretary of the asso-
ciation. The meeting will be held
in San Francisco.

Delegates from 15 lodges are ex-
pected to meet in Salem in connection
with the annual convention of the De-
gree of Honor, central Willamette dis-
trict.

Russians Would Fight for U. S.

Washington.—John Sookine, first
secretary of the Russian embassy and
an officer of the Russian army, and
Ferdinand De Mohrenschildt, the sec-
ond secretary, who married Secretary
McAdoo's daughter last May, have of-
fered their services to the American
government for the war against Ger-
many. They resigned rather than
serve the Bolsheviks.

British and French Aid Italians.

Italian Army Headquarters in North-
ern Italy.—Solid ranks of Franco-Brit-
ish infantry with artillery and supply
trains were seen by the correspondent
within sound of the battle on the Italian
northern line. They had been on an
eight-day march.

General Sibert's Son an Army Private.

San Francisco.—Martin D. Sibert,
son of General William L. Sibert, sec-
ond in command of the American
forces in France, is a private in the
ranks at the Presidio.

BRIEF WAR NEWS

More than 100 guns were captured
by the British during the recent of-
fensive toward Cambrai, including
numerous heavy pieces.

Normal artillery and normal patrol
activity—but abnormal mud—ex-
presses the trench conditions on the
"American front" in France.

The second army on the Russian
northern front has removed its of-
ficers, agreed to the Bolshevik armis-
tice proposal and pledged its sup-
port to the extremists.

A bloody civil war in Russia is
predicted as the result of the spread
of famine in the army at the front,
where soldiers are reported to be
dying and deserting by the hundreds.

After hard fighting the British
forces are now in possession of Bour-
lon and the greater part of Bourlon
wood, west of Cambrai, giving them
a dominating position over the much-
sought-for railroad center and the sur-
rounding country.

The Germans are resisting desper-
ately the British advance around Cam-
brai, which is being pressed most
energetically. General Byng's evident
intention is to drive in behind the
main Hindenburg line, breached in
last week's surprise attack.

In Palestine the British are closing
in on Jerusalem, their official state-
ments claiming added interest because
of the increasingly frequent mention
of Biblical names. The site of the
ancient Mizpah, some eight miles west
of Jerusalem, was carried by storm.

French and British soldiers have
reached the fighting zone north of
the Venetian plains to aid the Ital-
ians in their brave defense against
the invading Austro-German forces.
Between the Brenta and the Piave
the Italians are withstanding success-
fully massed enemy attacks. The in-
vaders attempted to rush the defend-
ing lines on the left, in the center
and on the right of the short front
between the rivers, but were crushed
everywhere by the Italians.

Four sororities at the Oregon Agri-
cultural college, Delta Alpha, Alpha
Chi Omega, Pi Beta Phi and Beta Tau
Beta, have adopted French war or-
phans, in order to aid the French gov-
ernment in the care of the French
children.

Clay Tallman, commissioner of the
general land office, has written to
Representative Hawley stating that
none of the Oregon & California
grant lands will be thrown open until
next spring, when some of the classi-
fications will be in shape that people
may go on the lands early.

Norway Starts Boycott on Germany.

Christiania.—The Tidens Tegn says
the Norwegian Water association has
adopted a resolution proclaiming a
complete boycott of Germany, German
shipping, German trade and German
citizens in Norway.

General Greene Asked to Give Facts.

Seattle, Wash.—By a vote of 5 to 4
the Seattle city council adopted a res-
olution requesting Major General H. A.
Greene, commanding the Camp Lewis
cantonment, to submit evidence sub-
stantiating his charge that a vice syn-
dicate with "men high in authority
involved" is operating in this city,
making it an unsafe place for soldiers
to visit.

Prohibition Defeated in Ohio.

Cincinnati.—Prohibition has been
defeated in Ohio by a majority of 1723
votes, according to official returns
from all counties.

Women Arrested for Picketing Wilson

Washington.—Forty-one members of
the National Woman's party were ar-
rested at the two front gates of the
white house for picketing.

With a view of being prepared to
do paving work on force account next
year, the state highway commission
has called for bids on asphaltic paving
plants. The bids are to be opened
November 27.

About 35,000 Chinook salmon eggs
from the central hatchery at Bonne-
ville have been placed in the Oregon
Agricultural college hatcheries. They
will be used to help develop the fish-
eries industries.

The city of Portland has received a
bid of \$5.60 a ton for waste foodstuffs,
now being burned at the municipal
garbage incinerator. It is the purpose
to sell these foodstuffs to feed hogs
and other animals.

Eight women are employed in the
plant of the Springfield Planing Mill
company at Springfield, and the pro-
prietors of the mill have found the
experiment such a success that it is
probable more will be employed.
