Obituary

James M. Hassler was born in East Tennessee January 16, 1832; died November 24, 1917, making his age 85 years, 10 months and 8 days.

He moved with his parents to Caloway county, Missouri in 1835, where he resided until 1853 when he crossed the plains to California and remained there until 1860, when he came to Linn county, Oregon and settled on Crabtree creek.

On July 14, 1861 he was united in marriage to Miss Rebecca Jane Cyrus, who died September 14, 1863. To this union was born one child. On February 3, 1867 he was married to Emaline Richardson. To this union were born nine children, of whom seven and his wife survive him. He became a member of the Providence Baptist church in the fall of 1861.

Uncle Jim Hassler, as he was known to many, was one of the best pioneer citizens. Being reliable and honest, a good neighbor and a kind husband and father, he filled his modest niche in life in a manner which enabled him to leave to his family a heritage of honor and uprightness of which they may well feel proud.

Road Tax Meetings

Five road tax meetings were held last Saturday for the purpose of voting or rejecting a special road tax for 1918.

North Scio voted a 5-mill tax; South Scio a 4½-mill tax; district No. 33, W. M. Phillips supervisor, rejected a special tax; district No. 25, (Bilyeu Den) voted 2½ mills and district No. 14, (Shelburn) voted a 4-mill tax. So four out of five districts have the road building fever all right and will build roads next year.
