voters of said school district to provide an extra levy above that for ordinary school purposes to pay this indebtedness, and which they have failed to do, and

Whereas, At the special taxpayers meeting, held on the 30th day of November, 1917, they again failed to provide the necessary funds for the improvement ordered and, also, again reduced the levy to such an extent as to make it impossible to maintain a Standard school without still further increasing the indebtedness of the district, therefore

Resolved, We, as a school board and each individually for himself, as members of the board of directors and clerk of said district, hereby resign our positions as follows, to take effect January 5, 1918:

A. G. Prill, Director. Term expires June, 1919
J. L. Calavan, Director. Term expires June, 1920
J. F. Wesely, Clerk District 95. Term expires June, 1918.
