Soldier's Menu at Camp Quantico, Va.

The following is the menu supplied by Uncle Sam to our soldier boys at Camp Quantico, Virginia. If any of the boys went away from mess hungry, it was their own fault: Oyster soup, roast turkey and gravy, oyster dressing, mashed potatoes, cranberry sauce, boiled sweet potatoes, creamed asparagus on toast, celery, lettuce salad, green olives, pumpkin pie, mince pie, fruit jello, fruit cake, grapes, oranges, apples, bananas, mixed nuts, raisins, cider, ice cream, coffee, cigars and cigarettes.

The menu was sent to his parents by Schuyler Parker, 79th company, 6th regiment, U. S. M. corps. Soldier Parker is a son of J. F. Parker, of near Scio.

Our Uncle Samuel is certainly treating his boys lavishly. Compare the above menu with that of a hard-tack-sowbelly menu of Civil war days and then cuss, you old coffee coolers.
