BRIEF WAR NEWS

Prisoners taken in the great re-
newed Italian drive reached a total of
16,000, the Austrian war office an-
nounced.

Hostilities have ceased on the Rus-
sian front from the Black Sea to the
Baltic, as a result of the 10-day ar-
mistice, signed last week.

The cessation of hostilities along
the eastern front has extended to that
part of the line held by the Rouman-
ians, according to an official commu-
nication from Jassy.

Little infantry action is in progress
on the front in France and Belgium,
although on various sectors from the
North Sea to the region of Verdun mu-
tual bombardments are ensuing.

In the Verdun sector the Germans
have made another attempt to pierce
the French lines in the region of Be-
zonvaux, but were repulsed after some-
what brisk fighting and suffered con-
siderable casualties.

Civil warfare in Russia apparently
has come. General Kaledines, the
leader of the Don Cossacks, supported
by General Korniloff, former com-
mander-in-chief of the Russian forces,
is declared in an official commu-
nication issued by the Bolshevik govern-
ment, to have raised the standard of
revolt in the Don Cossack region
against the people and the revolution.

The Italians have succeeded in keep-
ing back the rush of the Austro-Ger-
man forces from the Asiago plateau
region to the plains of northern Italy.
Although the enemy had bent back
the line of the defenders to a point
where it seemed that it must give way
under the pressure of overwhelming
numbers, the Italians, reinforced by
British and French troops, have, for
the moment at least, brought the fight-
ing to a pause.

TEUTONS MOVE FORWARD

Area Vacated by General Byng Reoc-
cupied by Germans.

British Headquarters in France.—
The Germans have reoccupied the de-
vastated area bequeathed to them by
the British when General Byng made
his withdrawal from the Cambrai salient.

It was an unsavory task that faced
the enemy. The Bourlon wood still
was reeking with poisonous gas, Grain-
court, Anneux, Cantaing, Noyelles,
Marceling and Maanieres were a waste
of ruins, and the low-lying ground on
which the Germans apparently had
planned to dig their new trenches
were overlooked by the British posi-
tions.

Into this desert the big guns hurled
tons of explosives and machine gun-
ners sent a constant stream of bullets
into the ranks of the enemy sent for-
ward to prospect for desirable points
available for defense. Meanwhile the
major portion of the British army was
sitting comfortably in their new home
in what was formerly the famous Hin-
denburg trenches.

The withdrawal leaves the British
in full possession of the Hindenburg
line between the Nord canal and Vil-
liers-Polouch.

Finn Republic Proposed.

Stockholm.—A proposal submitted
to the Finnish landtag by the senate
provides that Finland shall become a
republic, with a president elected for
a term of six years, according to ad-
vice reaching here from Helsingfors.

British Capture Jerusalem.

London.—Andrew Bonar Law, chan-
cellor of the exchequer, announced in
the house of commons that Jerusalem,
after being surrounded on all sides by
British troops, had surrendered.

Kaiser's Message May Offer Peace.
Geneva.—Kaiser Wilhelm's Christ-
mas message to the German people
will contain his "final" peace offer,
according to an unofficial report re-
ceived here from Berlin.

Government Will Erect Huge Plants.

Washington.—More than \$90,000,000
will be expended by the government
in the erection of government explo-
sive plants, Secretary of War Baker
announced.

House Will Vote on Suffrage Jan. 10.
Washington.—Vote in the house on
the woman suffrage constitutional
amendment on Thursday, January 10,
was assured when the rules committee
agreed on that date.

The last of the rural credits fund—
\$3000—has been loaned by the state
land board. In view of the fact that
state bonds cannot now be sold at par,
it is not likely that the board will
issue any more rural credits bonds
until full value can be realized on
them.

BRIEF WAR NEWS

The strength of the Austro-German
invaders in Italy is placed by official
dispatches from Rome at 60 divisions.

Further extension of the British
lines beyond Jerusalem was reported
in the official statement from General
Allenby.

Generals Kaledines and Pototaky
and staffs have been arrested by Bol-
sheviki forces, it was officially an-
nounced in Petrograd.

The Germans already have begun to
obtain furs and other sorely needed
supplies from Russia, according to in-
formation from Petrograd.

The agreement for an armistice be-
tween the Bolshevik government in
Russia and the Teutonic allies has
been signed. It will run from Monday
until January 14 and then will con-
tinue in force automatically unless
seven days' notice of its discontinuance
is given. Upon the signing of an ar-
mistice peace negotiations are to begin.

Notwithstanding the terrible losses
they have sustained, the German and
Austro-Hungarian armies in the moun-
tainous region of northern Italy con-
tinue their efforts to break the Italian
line and open a passageway to the
plains below.

East of the Brenta the Teutons have
been able, by throwing huge volumes
of men into the fray and seemingly
disregarding the enormous casualties
that are being inflicted on him, to ad-
vance on Caprille hill, dominating
point at the head of the San Lorenzo
valley, which leads to the Venetian
plains. Here, however, he has been
forced to stop under the terrific de-
fense of the Italians.

17 Americans Missing in France.

Washington.—Seventeen enlisted
men of the United States army en-
gineer corps were reported missing in
action by General Pershing in a dis-
patch to the war department. They
were missing November 30, the day of
the German turning movement at
Cambrai, and are believed to have
fallen into the hands of the Germans.

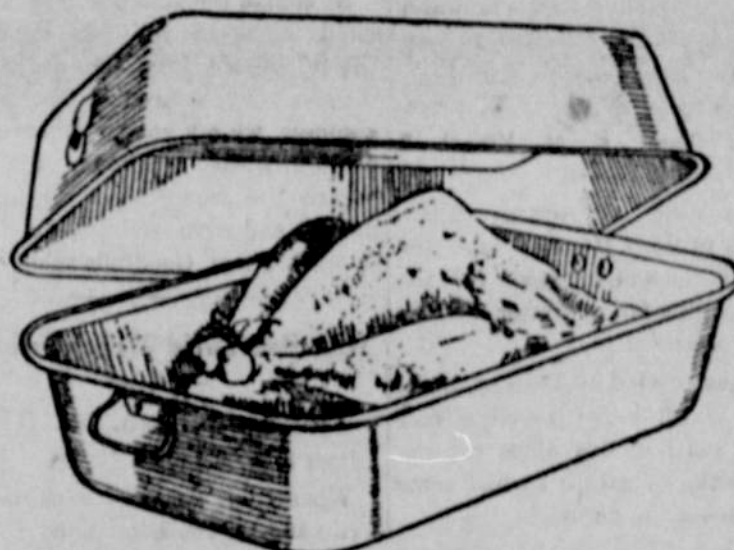

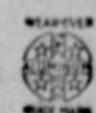
