Hermosa Beach, Dec. 11, '17.
Editor Scio Tribune—

When I left Scio you asked me to write and let you know how I was getting along, but I have been so busy since my arrival here that I have hardly had time to write.

Our trip down by auto was a pleasant one. Coming down the Pacific Highway as far as Grants Pass we crossed over the mountains to Crescent City, Cal., and then down the California coast to San Francisco. The gigantic redwood is very beautiful and much larger than the big firs of Oregon.

Upon arrival here I secured employment with the Union Tool Works at Torrance. This is one of the largest manufacturing plants on the Pacific coast, employing about 1000 men. I average about \$25 a week now with good prospects of an increase soon. I live at Hermosa Beach, about four miles from my work. For awhile I went back and forth to my work on a motorcycle which I bought, but now go by automobile. Our friend, Jud J. Barnes, of Scio, paid us a visit few days ago and his visit reminded me that I ought to keep in touch with what is going on at Scio, so I wish you would enter my name on your subscription list for a year and send me your bill.
