OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week
Briefly Sketched for Infor-
mation of Our Readers.

A 15 per cent increase in freight rates,
except on fuel wood, was granted by
the public service commission to the
Portland Railway, Light & Power com-
pany on all the interurban lines.

The stormy weather for the past
two weeks, causing numerous slides
and washouts has resulted in an al-
most total absence of the usual crowd
of midwinter visitors at Newport.

A substantial growth in the mint
producing industry in Oregon during
the past year was shown at the annual
meeting of the Willamette Valley Mint
Growers' association held at Albany.

Multnomah and Clarke counties will
realize a net profit of more than \$110,
000 a year in receipts from the inter-
state bridge, according to figures and
estimates which have been compiled.

The outlook for the lumber industry
in the lower Columbia river district
for the coming year is most encour-
aging and the indications are that the
output of the plants will be greatly in
excess of that of the present year.

The secretary of the interior has
withdrawn from entry for power site
purposes 196 acres of public land on
the Big Sandy river below the mouth
of the Salmon river. The land may
be used only for power developments.
Whether or not the Grange, Farm-
ers' Union and State Federation of
Labor shall unite in fostering the or-
ganization of the Farmers' Non-Parti-
san League in this state will be decid-
ed by those organizations within the
next month.

Until it receives definite information
as to the plans of the government in
handling the railroads of the country,
the public service commission will
pursue its accustomed course in all
matters coming before it pertaining
to railroads.

For the first time in the history of
Hood River valley, vinegar and cider
manufacturing plants find it necessary
to import cull apples from other north-
western districts in order to keep
their presses running and to fill their
tanks throughout the winter season.

Suit to quiet title of 2,873,661 acres
of Oregon-California grant lands was
filed in the federal court at Portland
by the government against the South-
ern Pacific company. The govern-
ment, through the court, seeks to
quiet title to all lands the company
sold prior to the forfeiture suit and to
compel it to account for money se-
cured by alleged illegal sales where
purchasers bought more than 160
acres or paid more than \$250 an acre.

Bank aid to boys and girls on farms
who wish to join "pig clubs" is being
arranged for throughout the state by
L. G. Allen, leader of pig club work.
Under the conditions arranged by Mr.
Allen the banks agree to lend the chil-
dren money for purchasing pigs or
brood sows at 6 per cent interest.
Only pure-bred stock may be raised by
the club members. The children have
meetings and demonstrations and are
organized through the aid of school
officials.

Petitions are being circulated in out-
lying parts of Lincoln county demand-
ing recall of County Judge Miller and
Commissioners Hurt and Wakefield.

A barreling plant will be established
in Albany in time to handle next year's
crop of strawberries, loganberries, phe-
nomenal berries and other small fruits.

By a vote of 194 in favor to 81
against, the Central Oregon Irrigation
district was formed in Deschutes coun-
ty at the election held on the project.

Cook county dairymen claim that
more thoroughbred dairy stock has
been purchased there in the last three
years than in any other section of the
state.

The second and third companies of
the Oregon coast artillery were each
presented with a Christmas gift of a
phonograph by the girls' honor guard,
of Eugene.

The federal government has sent
Miss Anna Barrows as its representa-
tive in food conservation work to Ore-
gon Agricultural college from Decem-
ber 31 to January 5.

Members of the Loyal Order of
Moose in Oregon will organize a state
field day association at the time of
dedicating the new Moose temple in
Portland, January 2.

State Game Warden Shoemaker has
issued an order to close commercial
fishing on Tallroos lake, on the South-
ern Pacific railway, between the Ump-
qua and Siuslaw rivers.

LABOR VOTES TO CONTINUE WAR

London.—The position of the British
government in its stand on peace was
greatly strengthened by the action of
the national labor conference in vot-
ing for a continuation of the war.

This attitude taken by labor was
doubly significant in view of the fact
that it followed the offer of Germany
and Austria to make peace on a basis
of no annexation nor indemnities.

Both England and France, through
members of their governments, have
repudiated the Teutonic offer to nego-
tiate peace on a basis of the status
quo ante bellum and it is unlikely that
the secular note being drafted by
Leon Trotsky, the Bolshevik foreign
minister at Petrograd, will be answer-
ed.

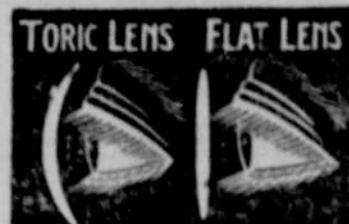


First Lieut. D. H. Harden, of the

Belgium Gets Two Million More.
Washington.—Two million dollars
lent to Belgium last week brought the
total of American credits to that coun-
try to \$69,900,000. Credits to all the

900,000.
