OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week
Briefly Sketched for Infor-
mation of Our Readers.

The aircraft production board has
advised Senator McNary that it is
strongly disposed to award contracts
for airplane construction to properly
equipped factories on the Pacific coast.
The Valley & Siletz railway, which
was to have commenced operations as
a common carrier January 1, 1918, had
its line blocked by several landslides
near Hoskins, due to the heavy rains.
The Crook and Deschutes county
agricultural council held a meeting in
Redmond.

There are 53,254 children between
the ages of 4 and 20 years in Multnomah
county.

Mrs. Rosalie McMahan, 78 years old,
died at Salem. She crossed the plains
to Oregon in 1846.

The Douglas county court has ap-
propriated \$50,000 to buy liberty bonds
to be held as a courthouse fund.

Every one of the 71 residents of
the town of Isee, in Grant county, has
joined the Red Cross, it is reported.

Frank Wierent, a young man, resi-
dent of Airlie, was drowned in the
Luckiamute while helping on a drive
of logs.

As soon as the right of way between
Bend and Fort Rock can be secured
the Strahorn railroad will begin con-
struction.

Jason Machado, a pioneer merchant
of Coos county, is dead. He was a
resident of Myrtle Point, where he had
accumulated a large fortune.

The Portland Railway, Light & Power
company has filed with the public
service commission its application for
an increase of rates in the passenger
fares on the interurban lines out of
Portland.

Gus C. Moser, president of the Ore-
gon state senate, has made public an-
nouncement of his candidacy for the
republican nomination for governor at
the coming primary election which
will be held on May 17, 1918.

The Northwestern Electric company
has let contracts in Portland for the
immediate construction of an addi-
tional plant by which the company's
capacity for supplying electrical power
will be increased 50 per cent.

Trade Balance Favors Nation.

Washington. — America's exports
were estimated at the department of
commerce to have passed the \$6,000,-
000,000 mark in 1917, a new high re-
cord. Imports were less than \$2,000,-
000,000 and the trade balance in favor
of the United States probably will
be more than \$3,150,000,000.

First Submarine Prisoners Taken.

Washington.—The United States de-
stroyer Fanning, aided by the United
States destroyer Nicholson, was offi-
cially credited with capture of the
first German submarine prisoners of
war. Four officers and 35 members
of the crew were taken prisoners.

TO REGISTER ALL GERMANS

Certificate Cards Will Be Issued
Which Must Be Carried.

Washington.—The week of Febru-
ary 4 was set aside by the department
of justice for registration of the half
million of unnaturalized Germans in
the continental United States by police
and postmasters in pursuance of
President Wilson's alien enemy pro-
clamation directing this action as a
means of minimizing the danger from
enemy sympathizers.

Registration will involve the gather-
ing of detailed information concern-
ing the business, relatives and habits
of every German, together with his
photograph and finger prints. After
registering he must carry a certi-
ficate card and may not change his
place of residence without approval
of the police or postmaster. Violation
of the regulations will be punishable
by internment for the war.

The orders do not apply to German
women, nor to persons under 14, be-
cause these are not classed as aliens
by law. Subjects of Austria-Hungary
are not required to register.

French Triumph on Italian Front.

Rome.—In the Monte Tomba region
on the northern front the French have
captured many positions between Os-
teria di Monferena and Marankine,
the war office announces. They also
captured about 1400 men and 60 ma-
chine guns and seven cannon.

BRIEF WAR NEWS

The British forces under General Al-
lenby continue their victorious march
against the Turks in Palestine.

Cold weather and snow in the Euro-
pean fighting zone have reduced mili-
tary activities to a minimum in most
sectors.

France will not accept a peace based
on conditions before the war. Foreign
Minister Pichon declared in the cham-
ber of deputies.

Three British torpedo boat destroy-
ers were sunk through being struck by
torpedoes or hitting mines off the
Dutch coast with a loss of 13 officers
and 189 men.

In the Italian theater the infantry
for the present is idle, but the big
guns continue to carry out mutual
bombardment against points in the hill
region, from Asiago plateau eastward
to the Piave river.

German divisions, fresh from the
Russian and Roumanian fronts, are in
Turkey, operating with the sultan's
forces in an effort to wrest the holy
land from the British and restore the
falling Moslem morale, according to
official reports.

The German emperor, returning
with his staff from the Verdun front,
had a narrow escape during the re-
prisal raid of a British air squadron
on Mannheim. The emperor's special
train left the station an hour before it
was partly destroyed by several bombs.

Hundreds of Acres Flooded.
