OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week
Briefly Sketched for Infor-
mation of Our Readers.

Two fatal accidents were included
in the 341 reported to the industrial
accident commission for the week end-
ing January 3, inclusive. N. J. Crock-
ett, Notl, logger, and Gertrude New-
port, Astoria, cook, were the victims of
the fatal accidents.

The provision of chapter 292, laws
of 1917, which provides that "the coun-
ty court of each county may employ a
roadmaster" is mandatory if any road
work is to be done in the county, ac-
cording to Attorney General Brown.

Residents of the vicinity of Dorena
have formed an organization known as
the Row River Coyote club, for the
purpose of making war on coyotes,
which have been killing goats and
other small livestock. The club has
24 members.

Eight thousand stations for the sale
of war savings stamps are to be es-
tablished in Oregon during the week,
according to announcement by Charles
N. Wonnacott, associate state director
of the Oregon division of the national
thrift campaign.

Polk county farmers are puzzled over
recent heavy losses of sheep. While
it is known that dogs are doing the
work, there has appeared no effective
way to find the dogs.

Arnold Sandoz, in a fit of anger,
shot and killed his brother-in-law,
Lewis Chase, at the ranch home of
his father, Alfonso Sandoz, on Mill
creek, five miles south of The Dalles.

The building of 40 miles of track on
the Valley & Siletz railway, between
Independence and the Siletz basin, has
opened up the largest body of yellow
fir timber on any one watershed in
the state.

So that the production of milk and
other dairy products shall not be cur-
tailed, a nationwide movement has
been started by the Oregon Dairymen's
association to have dairy employees
within the draft age exempted or put
in deferred classification.

The metal production for Baker
county during 1916 totaled a little in
excess of \$3,000,000, according to the
report of Charles G. Yale, director of
the federal bureau of mines, and the
1917 production will come close to that
figure, although it probably will fall a
little short.

BRIEF WAR NEWS

Freezing temperatures continue to
hold the British front in an icy grip.

Last year 367 Norwegian vessels
with an aggregate tonnage of 566,000
were sunk.

Italy has adopted a drastic new pol-
icy to increase her fighting forces.
Physical requirements have been mod-
ified, and all men between the ages
of 18 and 44 years previously exempt-
ed for defects are ordered to present
themselves for further examination.

The American army in France is to
be reinforced by the American avia-
tors who became famous as pilots in
French escadrilles. Thirty-two men
mostly members of the Lafayette es-
cadrille, will be the first to be sworn
into the American army. Others will
follow them as rapidly as possible.

The peace negotiations between the
central powers and the Bolshevik
government in Russia have been
temporarily suspended by the Ger-
mans. It appears the rock upon
which a continuation of the pour par-
lers split was the demand of the Rus-
sians that the conference be resumed
at Stockholm, instead of at Brest-Li-
tovak.

FARM LADS NOT SUPERIOR

No Better Off Physically Than City
Cousin, Army Finds.

Washington.—The common belief
that country boys are superior phys-
ically to those bred in the city is not
supported by the records of the selec-
tive draft.

A special comparison made by the
provost marshal general's office be-
tween 10 large cities and 10 rural
counties in various parts of the coun-
try shows that the result was virtually
a tie, as 28.47 per cent of the city boys
were rejected, as against 27.96 per
cent of the country boys.

"The country lad," says General
Crowder's report, "accustomed to hard
physical labor, may be more muscular
than his city cousin, but he is not
superior in the possession of the de-
gree of physical soundness essential
to his acceptance as a soldier."

SLAYER OF FOUR KILLS HIMSELF

Camp Funston, Kan.—Captain Lewis
Whistler of the 254th infantry, became
his own executioner after suspicion
had been directed at him as the prob-
able murderer of four men in the bank
at the national army camp here who
were hacked to death with a hatchet.

Whistler shot and killed himself
with an army revolver after he had
written a note in which he said:

"I have been thinking of committing
suicide for a long time but I never had
a good reason. Yesterday I went out
and made myself a reason."

The murders in the bank were com-
mitted some time after 8:30 at night.
Cashier Kearney Wornall of the bank,
who had been terribly battered and cut
by the murderer, stumbled from the
bank covered with blood and fell at
the feet of a passing sentry. He de-
clared that a man in a captain's uni-
form had killed four men in the bank
and had fled.

Fingerprints of the murderer were
found in the bank. Because of Worn-
all's declaration that a man in a cap-
tain's uniform had done the killing,
all captains at the post were ordered
to report. It was soon after this order
was issued that Whistler's body was
found in his room in the officers' bar-
racks.
