OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week
Briefly Sketched for Infor-
mation of Our Readers.

During the past week 504 accidents
were reported to the state industrial
accident commission. Of this number
four were fatal, as follows: Jack
Allonius, Astoria, shipbuilder; A. E.
Breodon, Portland, shipbuilder; Ankle
Yocum, Sheridan, logger.

On account of war conditions, three
of Forest Grove's leading churches will
have only one pastor. To this end
steps were taken toward organizing the
three churches—Methodist, Christian
and Congregational—into one federated
church during the war period.

For the purpose of developing a bet-
ter system for the settlement of agri-
cultural and logged-off lands of the
state, Governor Withycombe has cre-
ated a new non-salaried commission,
to be known as the Oregon Land Set-
tlement commission. The commission
includes State Treasurer Kay, Salem;
O. M. Clark, Portland; William Han-
ley, Burns; Emory Olmstead, Port-
land; J. D. Farrell, Portland; Whitney
L. Holse, Portland, and William Pol-
man, Baker.

In a formal statement, Representa-
tive C. N. McArthur, of Portland, has
announced his candidacy for renomina-
tion upon a platform pledging con-
tinued support of the government's
war program.

The Oregon Association for the Pre-
vention of Tuberculosis has exceeded
its quota in the sale of Red Cross
Christmas seals by more than \$2000.
The total returns being \$12,161.86. The
quota was \$10,000.

Another big logging camp will be
opened at once in the coast mountains
west of Eugene, for the Booth-Kelly
Lumber company, adding largely to the
output of logs for the company's big
plant at Springfield.

On the morning that the daily papers
told of the worst blizzard of years in
the east G. W. McFarland brought into
Cottage Grove a tomato which had ri-
pened in his garden and which he had
found that morning.

Charles H. Gram, for six years presi-
dent of the state federation of labor
and for ten years deputy state labor
commissioner, has announced his can-
didacy for the republican nomination
as state labor commissioner.

One hundred per cent organized in
logging camps and lumber mills is the
record for Coos county. It is reported.
The Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lum-
bermen, a patriotic organization, now
has a total of 3821 members.

Never before in their history were
the factories of Oregon in a condition
as prosperous as at present. In nearly
all cases they are running to capacity,
and many of them have orders booked
which it will require months to fill.

FOUGHT U-BOAT FOUR HOURS

Heroic Resistance Made by Gunners
of Steamer Luckenbach.

Washington.—How the naval gun
crew of the American steamer J. L.
Luckenbach successfully fought off
for four hours the attacks of a Ger-
man submarine until a destroyer rac-
ing to the steamer's rescue forced the
U-boat to submerge, was told in an
official account by the navy depart-
ment.

The engagement described took
place while the vessel was en route to
a French port. The U-boat subjected
the merchant craft to a heavy shell
fire that injured seven men, started a
small blaze aboard and temporarily
put the engines out of commission.

"Don't surrender," flashed the com-
mander of the American destroyer
that caught the Luckenbach's distress
call.

"Never," was the laconic reply.

All members of the armed guard
have been commended by the navy de-
partment for gallantry in action and
the commander has been given the
temporary warrant of boatswain in
recognition of his service.

Army Supplies Burned.

Washington.—A quantity of army
supplies, including a large amount of
food, was destroyed, the quartermaster
warehouse ruined and several other
buildings damaged by a fire at the
Washington barracks occupied by en-
gineer troops. Colonel J. H. Earle,
commandant at the barracks, said the
fire was caused by forbidden smoking
by soldiers. An estimate of the dam-
age by Colonel Earle places the losses
at \$50,000.

German Yacht Seized.

New York.—The steel pleasure
yacht Joyeuse, said to be owned by
Emil H. Kleuge, an unnaturalized Ger-
man, of Englewood, N. J., was seized
by United States Marshal McCarthy.
Federal authorities said the yacht,
equipped with wireless, with Kleuge
on board and manned by a Swedish
crew, had been cruising recently along
the Atlantic coast.
