A concerted boost from a cooperating element, sending out articles to various papers all over the state, making it appear that there was a spontaneous outburst from the people wherein the facts in the case are the farmers are complaining that the cost of maintaining the college under Dr. Kerr is too much for the benefit received. The college under Dr. Kerr has won fame as a booster of ball games and it is persistent in pushing certain agriculturists on the county in defiance of the wishes of the farmers and tax payers.

We still hope there may be some specific action on the part of Dr. Kerr and the board of regents that the name of our college and state may not suffer.
