OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week
Briefly Sketched for Information of Our Readers.

War demands are putting new life into the lumber and logging industries in Benton county.

C. F. Williams, of Salem, has been elected president of the Oregon State Poultry association.

Oregon's Thrift campaign is gaining ground. Sales of war savings stamps have reached \$613,734.

The total payroll disbursements to the two big sawmills at Bend for the year 1917 were \$1,387,000.

Assisted by Baker school teachers, 20 of Baker's prominent business men have formed a knitting class.

A chronology of election dates as applying to the primary and general elections coming up in the state this year, has just been compiled by Secretary of State Olcott and will be published for distribution within a short time to those interested.

In a written opinion given to Adjutant General Williams, Attorney General Brown advises that the city of Marshfield's title to the block offered as a site for a new armory is not clear. He suggests that a suit should be instituted to clear the title.

Migratory birds have increased 50 per cent as a result of the new federal laws which now cover not only the United States, but Canada, according to a statement made by District Inspector Catron, who has charge of the states of Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

Organization for Oregon's part in the third Liberty Loan campaign is under way with a state executive committee composed of Edward Cook-ingham, chairman; J. C. Almsworth, George L. Baker, Franklin T. Griffith, William A. MacRae, A. L. Mills, Emory Olmstead, E. B. Piper and Nathan Strauss.

Within two years from now, highway commission officials predict, it will be possible for a man to ride between Salem and Walla Walla, Washington, without getting off of a paved road. Leading up to this the commission will probably award contracts at its next meeting for grading and macadamizing a road between the Morrow-Umatilla county line and Echo, and for grading and macadamizing a continuation of the road from Echo to Pendleton.

The terms of the district attorneys of Deschutes, Wheeler and Clatsop counties expire at the end of this year and their successors are to be elected in November, according to an opinion given Secretary Olcott by Attorney General Brown.

J. R. FRUM MAKES ANNOUNCEMENT

Candidate For Republican Nomination
For Sheriff Comes Out With
Statement

J. R. Frum, deputy to Sheriff D. H. Bodine, today makes formal announcement of his candidacy for the republican nomination to succeed his present chief. Mr. Bodine has previously announced his intention of not becoming a candidate again.

but will retire from politics to devote his attention to business interests.

Mr. Frum is a Linn county man, his grandparents on both sides of the family having come to Linn county and settle on donation land claims in the early 50's, and both his parents having been born in this county. His grandfather, Eugene Frum, settled on a tract 14 miles south of Albany in 1852. His father A. H. Frum, was born near Lebanon. The present candidate was born in Lebanon but, up to four years ago, lived on a farm near there.

After receiving his education in Lebanon high school he went into the office of the S. P. railroad at Lebanon, where he made a reputation for efficiency, the work at the time he left there last May requiring two men to take up and continue.

Since becoming deputy sheriff, Mr. Frum has continued his capacity for work and has made good in his present position. He is a member of Albany Lodge, Knights of Pythias, and belongs to the Masons and Modern Woodmen at Lebanon. In speaking of his candidacy, Mr. Frum says: "Having decided to become a candidate for the republican nomination for sheriff of Linn county, at the coming primaries, I take pleasure in making this announcement to the voters of the county for their consideration. After serving the public as chief deputy sheriff for practically the past year, I feel confident that I can give them good satisfaction."—Albany Democrat.

Prof. Horner's Lecture

Prof. J. B. Horner, of O. A. C., was greeted by a full house at his lecture on Oregon history Friday night. Prof. Horner has managed to collect a great many facts and anecdotes concerning the early days of Oregon, which are not given in the published histories and he tells them in a very entertaining manner. His lecture was illustrated with stereopticon views, which included life sized pictures of many of the men and women who, after a long ox team journey across the plains, peopled what was then generally named "The Oregon Country." A map of Oregon thrown on the screen was used to make comparison in size with other states and countries.

Commencing with the discovery of the Columbia river by Captain Gray, a sort of synopsis of Oregon history during territorial days and down to the present time was given, with views of territorial and state governors down to the present.

Prof. Horner did not fail to call attention to the fact that Scio had sent out a number of men who had made themselves conspicuous in the world of letters and business.

DISTURBANCES IN GERMANY REPORTED

London.—What news has been permitted to pass the German censor indicates that a political hornet's nest has again been stirred up in Germany.

Reports of disturbances in Germany again are current in Holland, and severe outbreaks are said to have occurred in the Rhenish industrial districts.

A dispatch from Zurich to the Exchange Telegraph company quotes the Berlin correspondent of the Frankfurter Zeitung as saying that the Pan-Germans are "kicking up a tremendous row," and declaring that Field Marshal von Hindenburg and General von Ludendorff, dissatisfied with Chancellor Hertling's speech before the male committee of the Reichstag, are again talking of retiring.

Emperor William, himself, has not been spared, says the Deutsche Tages Zeitung, which styles him "the present representative" of the House of Hohenzollern, probably desiring to show by a parallel between the emperor and the crown prince that the annexationists cherish the latter as the savior of Germany at the last moment "from sinking in the abyss dug by four men—Dr. von Kuehlmann, German foreign secretary; Count von Hertling, imperial chancellor; Count Czernin, Austro-Hungarian foreign minister, and Count von Roeder, German secretary of the treasury."

Ben's Hat in the Ring

Secretary of State Ben W. Olcott has announced his candidacy to change his office in the state house just across the hall and to become the central figure of the state as its governor. Mr. Olcott is an especially well trained business man and has manifested his efficiency as a business man in the secretary's office. Everybody recognizes his efficiency and honesty as an official and the people will not make a mistake if they nominate him at the forthcoming primaries. Mr. Olcott, though a republican, has not been partisan in the administration of his office. As a member of the state board of control composed of the governor, secretary of state and state treasurer, he has been a sort of balance wheel and has ever been for the interests of the people. But he is not popular with the politician element of his party and they are sure to encompass his defeat if possible, for they know that they cannot control him. Should he be elected he will be governor and not subservient to a bunch of Portland politicians.

Should he be nominated and elected, Mr. Olcott says he will resign his present office, so that Governor Withycombe can name his successor.

He also promises to place the governor's office, the various state institutions and commissions on the best possible business basis and to enforce economy and efficiency in every branch of the state government over which he can exercise control. The republican party will make a mistake if it does not nominate him.

COUNTRY PUT UNDER STRICTER FOOD RULE

Dealers in Wheat Flour and Bakers Limited to Percentage of 1917 Requirements.

Washington.—President Wilson has placed the country on stricter food rations.

In a proclamation he limited wholesalers, jobbers and retailers to 70 per cent of their 1917 wheat flour requirements and bakers to 80 per cent.

He called for observance of two wheatless days, Monday and Wednesday, one wheatless and one meatless meal daily, meatless Tuesday and porkless Saturday.

Simultaneously the food administration announced its new "Victory bread," to contain 20 per cent of cereals other than wheat, after February 24.

It also announced Tuesday would be a porkless day in addition to Saturday.

These drastic steps are necessary to provide wheat for Europe, the food administration stated. Thirty per cent of America's normal wheat consumption must be sent to our allies. Only radical cuts in the American bill of fare will provide the 15,000,000 bushels monthly which the allies require.

Only part of the new food regulations will be compulsory under the powers possessed by the food administration. Dealers can be checked through licensing, but the food administration freely admitted that it would depend on the patriotism of the American housewife to force observance of the new war rations.

"Victory" war bread, the national loaf, is expected to provide the big saving in wheat consumption.

Graham and whole wheat breads will be classed as victory breads, but the real war loaf will be that mixed by substituting 20 per cent of rice flour, cornmeal, potato flour, oatmeal, buckwheat flour, sweet potato flour, soya bean flour and other substitutes. Retailers are ordered to sell wheat flour only with an equal amount of one of these substitutes.

Housewives need not mix these in their baking, though this is urged.

15 Airplanes Attack Britain.

London.—About 15 German airplanes, of which four or five reached London, took part in raids Monday night. Officially it is announced that 47 persons were killed and 169 injured in the raid. One of the raiding aircraft was brought down.
