EAST HEATLESS MONDAY

Retail Establishments Except Drug
and Food Stores Close.

Washington.—The eastern half of the United States observed Monday generally as a holiday, the first of 10 heatless Mondays decreed by the government to conserve coal and clear congestion from the railroads.

Although the closing order, promulgated by Fuel Administrator Garfield goes no further than to forbid the use of fuel for heating, fuel administration officials expected business to cease and Dr. Garfield issued a direct request that all retail establishments except food and drug stores, close their doors for the day.

Food stores which, in the original order were permitted to remain open only half the day, were granted a special dispensation under which they may sell goods throughout the day.

Fewer Deaths Reported At Camp

Tacoma.—Health conditions at Camp Lewis improved considerably in the last week, according to the report issued by the division surgeon. There were five deaths, including one from pneumonia and one from meningitis. The cases of communicable diseases total 146 among 31,500 men. German measles and scarlet fever showed a marked decrease.

WAR COUNCIL SAYS PEACE IS REMOTE

London.—The supreme war council, which met at Versailles, finds no approximation in the German chancellor's and the Austro-Hungarian foreign minister's speeches to the terms of the entente allies and has decided to continue vigorous prosecution of the war until peace can be obtained "based on the principles of freedom, justice and respect for international law."

A summary of the official report of the Versailles war office says:

"The council was unable to find in V. Hertling's and Czernin's recent utterances any real approximation to the moderate conditions laid down by the allies' governments."

"Under the circumstances, the council decided that the only task before them to meet was the vigorous and effective prosecution of the war until the pressure of that effort produced a change of temper in the enemy governments, justifying the hope of the conclusion of a peace based on the principles of freedom, justice and respect for international law."

"The council arrived at a complete unanimity of policy on measures for the prosecution of the war."

The United States was represented in the council by General Tasker H. Bliss, chief of staff of the American army.

BRIEF WAR NEWS

Sixty-six persons were killed and 183 injured in the two German raids over London last week.

Many German prisoners in Russia, taking advantage of internal disorders, are returning to the German lines.

Food riots have broken out in Vienna, according to reports received. Shops have been pillaged and clashes have occurred between rioters and the police.

It was officially announced that the total number of deaths resulting from the recent airplane raid of the Germans over Paris was 49 and the total wounded 206.

Great Britain has asked Brazil and Uruguay for the use of interned German merchant ships for the transportation of grain, according to information received from Rio Janeiro.

British expeditionary forces in Palestine again have assumed the offensive, official war reports stated. General Allenby's line has been advanced to Anutieh, three miles north of Birah on the Nabulus road.

Severe measures of repression have been taken by the German government against the workers whose strike movement in important industrial centers has tied up many plants engaged in munition and war supply work. Berlin and its environs remain the center of the disturbance. The city is under military control. Factories where strikes are in progress have been militarized, say dispatches, and the workers warned to report for work or undergo military discipline.

Many Soldiers Take Federal Insurance
San Francisco.—Soldiers in the western department of the army have taken government insurance to the total value of \$178,000,000 and before the period of automatic insurance, February 12, it is believed most of the 47,000 men in this jurisdiction will hold government policies, according to Captain E. H. Pearce, officer in charge.

Wool Stocks Have Decreased.
Washington.—Wool stocks in the United States were about 562,000,000 pounds December 31 last, the department of agriculture announced in its third quarterly report. That was a decrease of 71,000,000 pounds from stocks September 30, 1917.

After deliberating only 45 minutes, a jury in the United States court at Portland found Floyd Ramp, active socialist of Roseburg, guilty on each of two counts in an indictment charging him with a violation of the espionage act.

Fishing is now prohibited in a number of Klamath county streams. The warm weather has caused the fish to go upstream for the spawning time much earlier this year, and these certain points are closed to protect future fishing.

One man was hurt and from \$5000 to \$6000 in damage was done when the three-story frame hotel, recently constructed by the Sommarstrom Shipbuilding company at Columbia City, two and one-half miles from St. Helens, was completely destroyed by fire.

BRIEF WAR NEWS

The kaiser was 59 years old Sunday. A new contingent of Portuguese troops has just been landed in France.

Both France and England have recently cut down the bread ration by almost half.

The Bolshevik government, says an announcement from the semi-official news agency, decided to break diplomatic relations with Roumania when temporary detention of the Roumanian minister failed to stop the Roumanian offensive.

Philipp Scheidemann, president of the Social Democratic party in Germany, answering Chancellor von Hertling's speech in the main committee of the Reichstag, is reported to have bitterly assailed the German junkers and militarists.

Italy has furnished a military surprise by launching an attack of apparently considerable force on her mountain front in mid-winter. The blow comes on the Asiago plateau, where the Austro-German invaders were halted early in the winter in their effort to push down to the Italian plains west of the Brenta river.

Foreign Minister Trotsky, addressing the congress of councils of workers' and soldiers' delegates on the question of peace, declared the Germans had masked their real intentions with fine words, but were in reality demanding all they could get. "They thought Russia needed peace at any price," Trotsky said. "They were mistaken. We still insist on a democratic peace."

Count Czernin, the Austro-Hungarian foreign minister, is reported from Vienna on good authority, has announced to the Austrian delegations that the text of his speech on the Austrian war aims was forwarded to President Wilson before its delivery. This has caused a great sensation, according to the Cologne Gazette, which interprets it to mean that actual steps already had been taken to bring about an exchange of views between the western powers and Russia and Germany.
