Quite a little excitement has prevailed in Scio during the past few days, due to the shut down of the condensery. But the farmers who have been supplying milk are disposed to give the company time to adjust itself under the supposition that the shut down was unavoidable.

Condensery Matters

The shut down of the condensery is a matter of regret to every body. All kinds of reports are in circulation, many of which are pure fabrications. But the general opinion is, the difficulty is in process of adjustment and that all bills will be paid at face value.

The cause of the trouble, we are told, is some fifteen or more cars of condensed milk are held up in transit because of the freight blockade, bad storms, etc. and a large amount of canned salmon owned by the company cannot be shipped for lack of cars.

It is simply a matter of a short time when the trouble will be overcome. The company is solvent and, as soon as returns can be received for the manufactured products, all will be well. Mr. Logan accompanied by E. C. Peery, are here now, but we cannot say what will be the result of their visit.
